BOY BURNED FIRE STATION

BELLEVILLE, O., June 21. - As the result of a fire started by an eleven-year-old boy, No. 1 fire station was last night burned to the ground at a loss of \$4,000. Donald Fooks lives next door to the fire station. He got some matches and proceeded to amuse himself by throwing them through a window into the hay just to see them burn. They burned. When arrested young Fooks confessed. He also admitted having set fire to the stables at the Queens Hotel on Thursday last. He informed the police that a girl named Amy Stewart, alias Brown aged 16 had been his accomplice in the arson case. She is now in the care of the police. The boy confessed to three fires and several attempts. The pair were brought up in Court this morning and the cases were enlarged. The girl is said to be weak-minded.

CARTER KILLED BY HORSE'S KICK.

MONTREAL, June 20. - Michael Hartigan a cartier, 46 years of age, was killed by a kick from a horse he was exercising in a yard in the rear of his home, 1150 Laurier street. Hartigan lived only a few minutes after receiving the kick. The horse belonged to George Webb, a cabman. The animal had been sick for a couple of days. Hartigan was leading it around in a circle in the centre of the yard, when it kicked him in the stomach. The man fell to the ground with his hands on his stomach, and the only words he uttered before he lost consciousness were: "I'm gone."

LONDON'S VAST ANNUAL IMPORTS

LONDON, June 18. - The board of trade tables for 1906 shows that London's over-sea imports last year reached the enormous sum of \$997,036,555 which was \$150,195,275 above the figures for 1905. In respect to imports London is about \$27,000,000 ahead of Liverpool, but the northwestern port far surpasses London as an outlet for British exports.

YOUNG HEROES LOSE LIVES

ROSSHAU, Lake Rossau, Ont., June 20. - As a result of a number of boys playing in a rowboat near here Thursday night, one of their number, Master William Chapman, aged 16 years, was drowned.
