MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—La Patrie's special from Ottawa says that Parliament will be called together for the despatch of business the first day of February.

Y. M. C. A. Hall looked radiant yesterday in its gay decorations and crowds of eager spectators each vying with the other to see all the exhibits which was a very fine one. What claimed first place in importance was a case holding a tiny kid glove and a silk sock worn by His Majesty King Edward VII when a baby. Others are a calabash nut from tree under which Sir Thomas Moore sat to write his poems. A picture of Moore's house is painted on the nut, a walrus tusk, rib of whale, section of whale's backbone, lace plant from West Indies, Indian tobacco pouch, smallest dictionary in the world, sword used in American war of 1861, a magnificent fossil fern, fac simile of first newspaper printed in America, a work in geometry (written) over 100 years old, crystal from Rocky Mountains, pattern of cask in Columbus' vessel when he came to America, Gaelic Bible used by five generations, Kruger's snuffbox collection of beads, etc., from Africa, etc. But the most practical part of the exhibit was the school work some of which was truly excellent. This included a map done by Miss Mary James which would do credit to any one as a piece of hand work, also botanical collections by G. Elliot, Fall, Freda Haszard, Helen Haszard and others which considering their years are worthy of special mention. Also a very nice collection of vegetable cereal and flower seeds put up in separate glasses and labelled, a work requiring no small degree of patience and perseverance on the part of the exhibitor. There was also a very nice exhibit of Island shells. But perhaps the most interesting feature of all were the specimens of drawing and penmanship done by the Primary class, which were especially good. There was also a very good display of penmanship from each department of the school. Besides all this there were numerous young ladies ever ready to cater to the tastes of any needing coffee and cake, ice cream, candy, etc. Altogether the exhibit was a very good one and considering the laudable object viz: the extension of the school library was well worthy of a large patronage. A large number attended the exhibit in the evening. The concert part was good. The readings by Miss Poole and Miss Phillips were heartily applauded. Rev. Mr. Williams' solo was excellent, while Miss Mary Warburton and Miss Amy Earle received hearty encores. A very nice piano solo by Maud Waterman, a young performer, and a cornet solo by Dr. Maloney concluded a short but interesting program. The remainder of the evening was spent in examining the exhibit and partaking of the very appetizing ice cream, candy and cake served by the school girls in their very best style. Proceeds about \$65.

250 BOERS CAPTURED

Three Laagers Rounded Up in One Day.

STRATHCONA'S INJURY.

Was from Fall Received in Canada—Vaccination Regulations.

LORD STRATHCONA'S INJURY.

NEW YORK, December 5.—According to the London correspondent of the Tribune Lord Strathcona's condition does not give cause for any alarm, but he is still confined to his residence as the result of an injury to his head, caused by a nasty fall just before sailing from Canada a fortnight ago.

250 BOERS CAPTURED.

PRETORIA, Dec. 5.—The largest capture of Boers made in many months occurred today, when three columns secured an aggregate of 250 prisoners.

U. S. VACCINATION REGULATIONS.

The United States Hospital regulations just issued are to the effect that all passengers to the United States must on arrival at the border produce a certificate of recent successful vaccination, otherwise before crossing they must be vaccinated and may be detained unless they can satisfy the United States health officials that they have not been exposed to contagion.

Prince's Words of Praise for Canada.

SPLENDID RECEPTION

Given to Chamberlain—Lord Salisbury's Weighty Words.

THE GUILDHALL BANQUET.

LONDON, December 5.—At the Guildhall banquet the Prince of Wales made a speech on the relations between the Motherland and the colonies. He referred to each colony he had visited, and in speaking about the Dominion of Canada said:

THE PRINCE PRAISES CANADA.

"To Canada was borne the message already conveyed to Australia and New Zealand, of the Motherland's loving appreciation of the services rendered by its gallant sons. In the journey from ocean to ocean, marvellous in its matchless scenery, the richness of its soil and the boundless possibilities of that vast and but partly explored territory we saw the success which has crowned the efforts to weld into one community the people of its two great races."

CHAMBERLAIN'S POPULARITY.

Mr. Chamberlain was accorded a tremendous reception when he rose to respond to Lord Rosebery's toast to the colonies.

LORD SALISBURY SPEAKS.

Lord Salisbury said: "No doubt it is true, just at this moment, that we have many enemies who are not very reticent in expressing their open hostility. But on the other hand today's celebration, which is largely due to the action and co-operation of their Royal Highnesses, has shown us that we possess, in the support of our distant kinsmen, an approval and a sanction which, to us, is worth infinitely more than all the contempt and all the censure that we may receive from other nations."

THE COLONIES APPROVE.

I cannot admit that they are judges of our conduct, or that we can modify our proceedings in deference to their opinion. What we look to is the opinion of our kinsmen who belong to our own Empire. We have received from all portions of that Empire an indication that we have lost nothing in the opinion they held of the justice of our claim."
