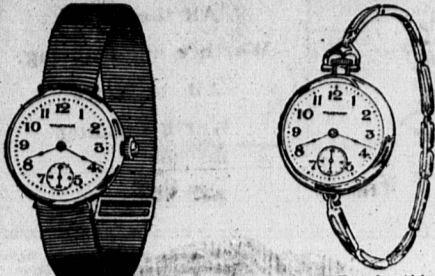

VANCOUVER, Sept. 19.—British naval reservists resident here are being called up for service. It is stated today, orders being received from London for them to report at once. Military officers, who have served in Mesopotamia and in the Near East, are reported to have received word to hold themselves in readiness to proceed overseas.

If There is a Row, Newfoundland Wants to be in it

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Sept. 19.—Great Britain has addressed to Newfoundland, as to the other British overseas dominions, an inquiry as to the ancient color's readiness to furnish a contingent of troops for operations in the Near East. To this inquiry Premier Sir Richard Squires, who is now in London, has replied. "Newfoundland does not want the British Empire to get into another row, but if there has to be a row we want to be in it."

World Series to Start Oct. 4 in New York City

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—The 1922 world series baseball championship will open on Oct. 4 in New York City. It was decided at a meeting of National and American League representatives here last year's prices will prevail.

The arrangements for the opening game in New York was made on the assumption that the New York Giants will win the National League pennant. Both New York clubs were represented at the meeting and the National League club won the toss to decide where the first game would be played. Should St. Louis win the American League championship the first game at St. Louis would be played on Saturday, October 7.

If St. Louis wins the American League race they play in New York on Oct. 4 and 5 and Friday, Oct. 6, would be travel day. Three games would be played in St. Louis, Oct. 7, 8 and 9. In case of a postponed game, the arrangements provided that such game should be played on the grounds where postponed prior to games scheduled at another city.

Following the three games which would be played in St. Louis, Oct. 7, 8 and 9, Tuesday, Oct. 10, would be travel day and the sixth game of the series would be played in New York, Oct. 11. In case the series should run to a 3 to 2 tie the contending clubs would be idle one day before the final deciding game. This would be played in New York on Oct. 12, if St. Louis was one of the contenders.

YARMOUTH WINS FIRST GAME OF TITLE PLAY OFF

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Sept. 18.—Yarmouth won from Springhill this afternoon in the first game of the finals for the baseball championship of Nova Scotia, by the score of 9 to 3. Yarmouth got twelve hits off Caulfield, of Springhill, while their pitcher, Forward, held the local players to three hits and two passes. The match was witnessed by the largest crowd that has gathered here for a baseball game this season. The second game will be played in Yarmouth on Friday next.
