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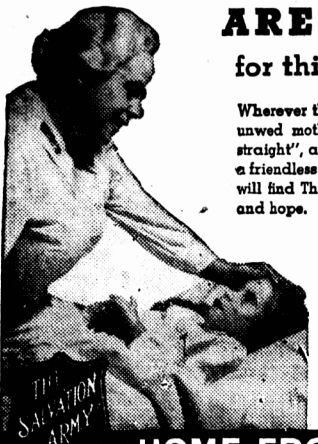

**BREAKFAST CLUBS GAIN POPULARITY**

Vancouver started it, Victoria followed, and now across Canada, business girls are getting up an hour earlier to attend the monthly eight o'clock meetings of their Breakfast Club.

A downtown restaurant or hotel is usually the Club's headquarters where the girls breakfast together and listen to a speaker they have invited for the occasion. Before dashing off to work.

The Credit Women's Breakfast Club in Canada is affiliated with the Credit Women's Breakfast Club of North America, popular for years in cities throughout the United States. Canadian clubs have been formed in Victoria, Vancouver, Chilliwack, B. C., Winnipeg, London, Ont., Toronto and Ottawa.

The clubs in British Columbia are responsible for publication of a monthly bulletin known appropriately as the Yawn News. Through the Breakfast Club women in offices and stores, whether dealing with retailer or consumer, may increase their knowledge and ability by attend-

ing the meetings, and through the exchange of experience and ideas prepare themselves for higher positions.

In the Toronto club, which has 75 members, the girls this fall will have lectures on public speaking. Other early morning talks have included everything from the advantages of grokking to actual business topics.

"Boss" breakfast meetings also are held occasionally to which employers are invited. Total yearly membership fees generally average around \$4 and for the most part are paid by the girls' employer.

"After all if she is sufficiently interested to spend her time taking part in these meetings, it seems only fair that her company should pay her fee," said J. H. Snydam, manager of the firm sponsoring the Toronto club.

**YOUNG DISGRACEFUL SAYS NONAGENARIAN**

TORONTO, Sept. 14 — (CP)—Young people today are a "disgrace" because their parents haven't brought them up properly, and girls in restaurants "who puff at their smokes like men" are disgusting, says Mrs. Phoebe Woods of Toronto who has just celebrated her 90th birthday.

"Where would some of the girls of today be if they had to take charge of a home? They wouldn't know what to do," she continued. "And when I was a girl no one would think of smoking cigarettes." Mrs. Woods has five children, two of whom live in Toronto, but she prefers to live in the Fern Oxley Home here because "I am very independent and having looked after myself for 90 years I'm not going to be a burden on my family now."

**SCOTTISH WAR FORT ACTIVE PEACE AREA**

GLASGOW, Scotland, Sept. 15—(CP)—Failans, the 25,000,000 wartime military port built in the Gareloch, long arm off the Clyde estuary, is becoming the main base for a west coast marine salvage, towage and shipbreaking business. Metal Industries Limited expects to employ 1,500 men and its facilities will include a 22,000-ton

floating dock and powerful cranes. First demolition job will be Admiral Jellicoe's flagship Iron Duke, recently salvaged at Scapa Flow. Later the company will break down the German battleship Derfflinger, salvaged in 1939 and still floating upside down—waiting for the wreckers. Steel and other materials which are recovered will go back into West Scotland industries.

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
