Gives Judgment on Union Question

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Nov. 6.—Political union of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, with Halifax as the Capital of the Maritime Provinces, was advocated today by J. Newton Harvey, prominent Vancouver business man, in an address to a service club here.

Regional tariffs, adjustment of subsidies and placing of banking facilities at the disposal of business men requiring them were also suggested to give the country "a wholesome, healthy, national Canadian spirit and thus make Canada what she is destined to be."

Mr. Harvey, a native of New Brunswick, deplored "discrimination" practiced by central Canada against both the Maritimes and British Columbia in the past.

Mickey Walker Is Suspended

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—The Montreal Boxing Commission refused to permit Al McCoy and Larry Johnson, negro brawler from Passaic, N. J., to meet in the headline bout of tonight's fight card and the whole programme was cancelled.

Johnson was suggested as a substitute for Mickey Walker who was suspended by the Commission for failure to keep the engagement. Walker notified the promoter of the bout he would be unable to appear because of the death of his father October 29. The promoter told the Commission he was not notified until Nov. 1 and the suspension of the former world welter and light heavyweight champion followed.


