Sporting Notes.

Punishment for Turfmen.
At the last day of the meeting of the Board of Review of the National Trotting Association some important decisions were made. In 1898 the judges of the Louisville meeting fixed the well-known reinsmen for laying up heats in the race for the \$5,000 Douglas purse. W. W. Foote, driver of John Nolan, 2.08, was fined \$500; George W. Saunders, driver of Mattie Patterson, 2.094, \$100, and Fred Keys, driver of Caracalla, 2.10, \$50. A few days afterwards the officials remitted all these penalties, while the rules provide the judges have no right to remit fines once imposed. The board afterwards ordered the officers of the Louisville track to remit the fines, which order they ignored, and at the recent meeting they imposed a fine of \$650 on the officers and suspended them and the association until the fine shall be paid and until the fines against Foote, Saunders and Keys shall be collected.

Another fine of \$100 was levied against the Louisville Association allowing McDowell, the former driver of Alix, Azote and other star performers, to start when they had been notified he was under suspension for non-payment of entrance fees at New York. McDowell was fined \$50 for his share in the transaction.

This driver was recently fined \$250 by the American Trotting Association for driving while under suspension, and was further held for the return of \$800 unlawfully won by the trotting mare Fanny Putnam while in his stable. She was represented to him as being without a record, and he won \$800 with her in 3.00 class. After the season was over it was discovered that Fanny Putnam had gained a record of 2.39 in a race at Victoria, B. C., before she was sent to McDowell. He made the common mistake of entering her anywhere in his own name and failing to state that she belonged to another horseman. The decision should be warning to Provincial horsemen, who seldom if ever give the name of the owner of a horse when making entries.
