Richmond Corn Cake. To three-fourths cupful of canned corn add one-half cupful of milk, one half tablespoonful of sugar, and two eggs, well beaten. Mix and sift seven-eighths cupful of flour (pastry, once sifted) with one tablespoonful of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Combine mixtures, and drop by tablespoonfuls in buttered muffin rings set in a buttered pan. Bake in a moderate oven. These are very good with roast beef.
