Waner brothers Reunited with Stengel's Braves

BOSTON, May 25—(AP)—Age may have cramped the style of Paul and Lloyd Waner but you can't prove that to baseball's most famous brother act—reunited again thanks to Boston Braves.

Now they're going to try stalling off father time a little longer at Casey Stengel's "fountain of youth."

Paul, the "Big Poison" of the famous duo, whose murderous one-two batting punch made Pittsburgh's Pirates a perennially dangerous flag contender for 14 years, is 38. Lloyd, "Little Poison," is 35. It appeared to be curtains for the brother act until this week-end when President Bob Quinn and Manager Casey Stengel of the Braves came to the rescue.

They figured they couldn't go wrong in picking up the loose end at which big brother Paul found himself, after watching little brother Lloyd, who came to the Braves almost three weeks ago, cover acres of outfield and hit a current 541 clip.

Details were completed Saturday night, with the brothers going into action once more against the Giants yesterday.

PITTSBURGH, May 26—(AP)—Young Billy Conn, tuning up for his bout next month with Joe Louis, battered Buddy Knox Dayton, O., heavyweight, into helplessness tonight before 27,042 fans, the referee awarding him a technical knockout victory in the eighth round of their scheduled 15-round bout.

The young light heavyweight champion, warned by Promoter Mike Jacobs to make a "good showing" to clinch his title bout with champion Joe, surprised his supporters and a corps of experts from the east with his punching.

Cubs lose to Cardinals

NEW YORK, May 26—(AP)—Chicago Cubs overcame a nine-run deficit at St. Louis today but eventually lost to the National League leading Cardinals, 12-11.

Home runs by Jimmy Brown and Don Padgett in the 11th inning provided the winning margin as the rampaging Cards marked up their seventh consecutive victory.

In the first of the 11th Bill Nicholson hit a home run which put the Cubs ahead 11-10.

Scoring four runs in a musical comedy fifth inning at Brooklyn, the Dodgers beat Philadelphia Phillies 6-4.

The Dodgers loaded the bases with none out on a walk and two singles in the fifth. Pinch hitter Joe Vosmik grounded to a double play as one run scored. Two more men walked to load the bases a second time. Then centerfielder Joe Marty dropped Joe Medwick's easy fly and shortstop Bob Bragan made a wild relay to let all three runners score.

Tiger rally Beats Tribe

NEW YORK, May 26—(AP)—A ninth-inning Detroit rally, paced by Bruce Campbell's two-run double against relief pitcher Joe Hoynes, gave the Tigers a 5-3 triumph over Cleveland Indians today and broke the American League leaders' victory streak at five games.

The Indians, playing at home, entered the ninth with a 3-2 lead and Buck Newson appeared destined to suffer his seventh set-back of the season. Instead, the Tigers chased lefty Al Smith and finished against Hoynes to give Buck his third victory.

Racing thrives On dog courses Of old Britain

LONDON, May 26—(CP)—Greyhound racing, always popular with the British working man, has lost little favor since the war began and the tracks, where meetings are held almost every week, regularly draw large crowds.

Before the war there were 14 tracks in London and 33 in the provinces, and most of these are still operating. Men and women from factories mingle with soldiers, sailors and airmen, wagging their heads on "Rusty Man" in the fifth then cheering the dog as it chases the electric hare.

Lots Of Betting

Stadiums usually are well-filled before the kennelmen have their charges ready for the first race. It is a noisy, holiday scene as people come and go, placing bets with their book-makers or making entries on their race card from the totalisator board.

The dogs, wearing bright-colored numbered coats, are led around the track before each race, then placed one by one in the six-cage trap, at the centre of the track, makes one circuit and when it passes through the trap the dogs are released.

Greyhounds are the only dogs which will run consistently merely for the joy of racing. Experiments were made with other dogs—African hares, running along a rail in the centre of the track, makes one circuit and when it passes through the trap the dogs are released.

Dogs are graded for each race so that animals which can travel a certain distance in 24.5 seconds won't compete against those which travel the same distance in 25.9 seconds.

Names of prominent British greyhounds are well known in England as Man of War, Equippole and Sea-biscuit are known to horse racing followers in Canada and the United States.

Best known was Mick the Miller whom trainers say depended more on his brains than on his speed in winning races. Born in Ireland in 1926, he was brought to London by a priest, who almost every classic at least once and was the idol of race track crowds. He ran a "command" race for King George VI, was filmed and when he died in 1936 was mourned and placed on exhibition at the National History Museum in London.

There are several classics for greyhounds, most famous of which is the Greyhound Derby which drew a crowd of 90,000 when it was first in 1927. Other classics include the Lure, the St. Leger and the Coastwatch.

Rationing has not affected seriously feeding of greyhounds. Instead of the usual beef, now they eat cooked horseflesh or other meat unfit for human consumption.

Cubs-Dodgers Games to stand As played

NEW YORK, May 26—(AP)—National League President Ford Frick today ruled that the May 18 and 19 games between Chicago Cubs and Brooklyn Dodgers, protested by the Dodgers on the grounds the Chicago club had violated the 25-player limit rule, should stand as played, but he fined the Cubs \$500 for a technical violation of the rule.

The protest involved Charley Gilbert, obtained by the Cubs in the Billy Herman deal and left at Montreal on option. He suffered a leg injury at Montreal and the Cubs notified the Montreal club to send the player to a Philadelphia hospital. The Dodgers claimed this constituted a recall, giving the Cubs an active roster of 26 men.

OTTAWA, May 26—(CP)—New wartime taxes on sporting attractions and other amusements were discussed with officials of the National Revenue Department by a delegation representing sporting interests of Montreal, Toronto and Ottawa.

The delegation included Tommy Gorman, General Manager of the Montreal Forum; Conny Smythe, Manager of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League; J. P. McGaffrey, prominent Ottawa sports figure, and Fraser Hadley, J. P. Ebbs and Gordon McLaren, all connected with Ottawa sporting interests.

"I am afraid it is going to knock professional hockey right out of Canada," Smythe said in an interview. "After all a hockey game is a hockey game but the same motion picture may be shown 5,000 times and perhaps more, I don't know."

"How about the amateurs?" Smythe was asked.
"I think they will be worse off," he replied.

Smythe said the delegation would see Finance Minister Tisley tomorrow.

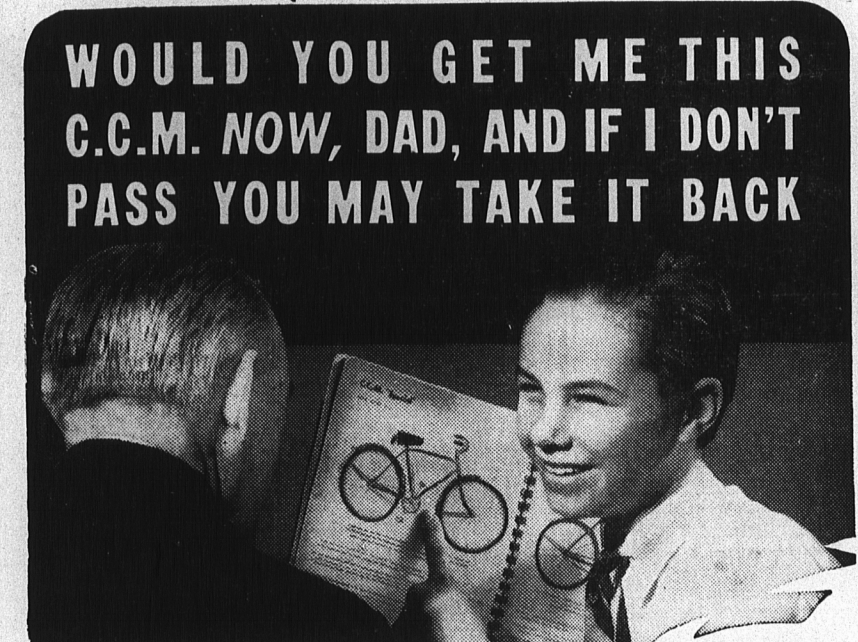

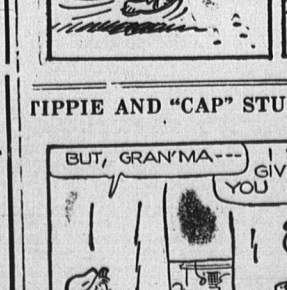

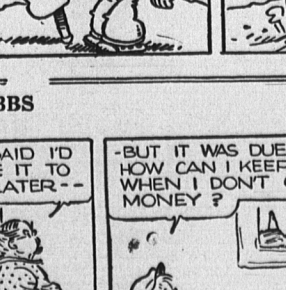
