These relics had spent the years asleep in a cedar-lined wardrobe built into the wall; and on the floor Father had grumpily fetched from

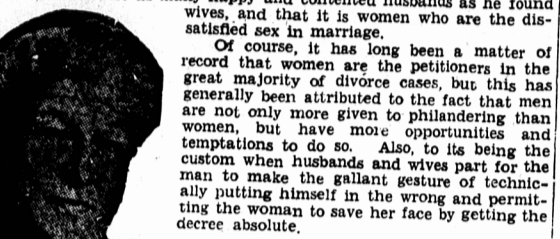
TRIANGLE PUZZLE

We have in quilt-dom many different kinds of puzzles, here is a very easy to piece puzzle. And very attractive as a quilt. It is an all-over pattern.

Blocks finish 12 inches square 42 blocks to quilt. One block joins another, with the light next the dark pieces. Border can be of the white or color.

Material Required: 5 1/2 yards of white 5 1/2 yards of color 1 1-3 yards extra for border. This would be equally pretty made in prints.

THE COOK'S CORNER

NEVER FAIL DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE

Three tablespoons melted butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 squares bitter chocolate or 4 desertspoons cocoa, 1 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon soda (dissolved in boiling water), 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 egg (use for icing if boiled icing is desired), 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add water with soda last.

LEMON CHEESE CAKES

For the filling for five small (individual) pies take 1 egg, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon of salt, the grated rind of 1 lemon, 1 large tablespoon of lemon juice, and 1/4 cup sifted sponge-cake crumbs. Beat the yolk of the egg; add the sugar, salt, lemon rind and juice, and the cake crumbs; mix thoroughly, then fold in the white of the egg, beaten dry, and turn into small tins lined with fancy pastry. Bake until the filling is set.

VEGETABLES

Vegetables, next to milk, are most important among human foods because they contain food elements such as minerals and vitamins which are necessary to health. One does not, however, enjoy sitting down to a vegetable course with the resolve to eat a certain number of units of minerals and vitamins regardless of taste, "because they are so good for us." Food which is pleasing to look at, which has a tantalizingly savory smell and delicious taste is eaten with relish, digested more easily and therefore is more nourishing.

Vegetable cookery is a fascinating art if you determine to achieve the utmost in flavor and appearance of the vegetables you serve. There are many new and delicious ways of serving them that you need never find the preparation of vegetables a monotonous work and your family will not find them monotonous eating. A few underlying principles should be kept in mind.

Choose vegetables as fresh as possible. It is an economy as well as one of the most important factors in the taste. Leafy vegetables should be bright and crisp. Flower vegetables, such as cauliflower and Brussels sprouts should have well-developed heads and no spots. Peas purchased in the pod should be neither too flat looking nor too well filled. In the first instance you get too little to cook from your bag of peas, and the over-developed ones are too old to taste good.

CONSULT DOCTOR IF NECK GLANDS ARE ENLARGED

A Lady who has been suffering from glandular trouble for some years came in to see me, writes a doctor. Her general health was good, but there were two glands in her neck which were about the size and consistency of a golf ball. She had already had a gland removed and the others treated with ultra-violet rays.

Now this was one of those painful cases which we meet from time to time where little can be done either to arrest the trouble or to remove it. I advised radium therapy for this lady, as I had seen a similar case where radium had stopped the spread of the disease in other glands.

All glandular enlargements are not of such a serious character. But medical advice should be taken when glands in the neck or elsewhere begin to enlarge. Of course, if there is any source of infection, such as a decayed tooth or a discharging ear, an enlarged gland is an obvious result.

A WOMAN'S NECK IS A TELL TALE OF AGE

From beauty standpoint, the neck is the tell-tale age. A woman may have a girlish complexion and hair, figure and hands that appear just as youthful, but if her throat isn't correspondingly young, her age secret is bared.

The unfortunate part of it is that necks have a tendency to age more quickly than faces, and once they do, it takes longer to get them back to par. Therefore, let's use the good old ounce-of-prevention method.

Remember that dryness causes fine lines which eventually will turn into deep wrinkles. And a bad posture does much the same thing. You should carry your head high, chin in, with back of the neck in a straight line.

It all happened so quickly that I did not really know what I was clinging to. I was not hurt, but was badly shaken and my clothes were torn. All I did was to cling on."
