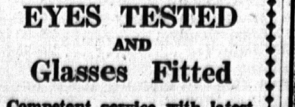
He expects to complete the trip about January 15, and plans a return to U. S. with the whalers, probably in March.

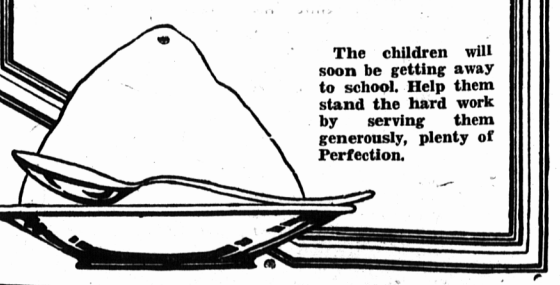
