This done revenue will meet a systematic expenditure.

Regarding the working man: The present Council has increased the wage rate several times, until now the lowest rate is \$2.25 per day up. Current conditions demand a further increase, that working man knows exactly where I stand, and if he does not, let him ask the Railway men whose interests I was in a position to protect from 1896 to 1910. Should the general policy herewith outlined meet with your approval, I shall appreciate your support on the 13th instant, and if elected, will exert my best efforts in carrying out our wishes. AGRICULTURE SHORT COURSE

An Agricultural short course was held in Enmore hall beginning on Jan. 22nd and lasting until the evening of the 25th. On account of the irregularity of trains no speakers were able to appear in time for the first meeting on Tuesday afternoon, as previously arranged. Professors Tenant and Shaw conducted the first five sessions. Mr. Tenant dealt on the topic of soils, explaining in a very interesting and instructive manner the composition of the different kinds of soil, and how it should be cultivated to ensure an abundant harvest. Professor Shaw brought out many points illustrating the difference between the various pure bred types of beef and dairy cattle. He fully convinced the audience of the futility of keeping a herd of poor stock, feeding them on scanty rations and expecting in return profit in proportion to the labor and expense of keeping them.

On Friday afternoon, Prof. Shaw, Mr. Morrow and Mr. McCrae addressed the audience. Mr. Morrow fully explained how very necessary the proper care of milk was, in order to secure first class cheese and butter. Mr. McCrae, well known as the owner of the best dairy cows in the Maritime Provinces, was listened to with rapt attention. He fully explained how he cared for his splendid herd of Ayrshires.

The last session on Friday evening saw the seating capacity of the building fully taken up. The topics for discussion were "The Care of Wool" and "Poultry Raising." As might be expected many ladies were present, for as we all know, the care of wool and poultry raising usually falls to the lot of the good women of the house.

Mr. Thompson in his lecture said, among other interesting facts, that a fleece of wool composed of fifteen different grades; how in washing after shearing, people only hopelessly mixed those different grades, thus spoiling the proper manufacture of cloth. Co-operative selling was urged as wool, in big lots only, will attract the buyers from abroad, cut out middlemen's profits, and secure for farmers the highest market price obtainable.

In Mr. Marsh's impressive speech he told how poultry raising could be made the most profitable business on the farm. A hen of good laying stock, when properly fed and housed, would yield at least 200 per cent profit on money invested.

At the conclusion of the meeting a vote of thanks was tendered to the several speakers for the very interesting and instructive lectures given. Throughout the entire course the attendance was large and much interest was evidenced by both young and old alike.

Let us hope that the many valuable hints given will eventually be adopted and lead to increased production, which, in those days of food shortage, is one of the most effective ways of serving country and King.—Y.
