EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the week ending Oct. 9, 1930.

Mr. T. H. Foster's B. R. pen 11 led the contest for the week with 37 eggs, 43.2 points; Mr. H. C. Muttart's B. R. pen 9 were second with 36 eggs, 41.5 points and the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B. R. pen 6 were third with 35 eggs, 37.1 points.

The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B. R. pen No. 7 in pen 5 leads the contest for individual laying with 242 eggs, 277.9 points; Mr. J. W. Bell's B. R. hens No. 7 and No. 5 are second and third with 235 eggs, 269.1 points and 226 eggs and 266.5 points respectively.

The pens leading in total production are:

1st. William Sansom, Durham Bridge, N.B., B. R. 2021 eggs, 2114.1 points.
2nd. James Tuplin, New Annan, P. E. I., B. R. 1921 eggs, 2110.5 points.
