AVIATION NOW AS SAFE AS FOOTBALL

The striking assertion above is made in an article appearing in the January Popular Mechanics Magazine, which tabulated the aviation fatalities of 1912 and comments on the death rate among airmen for several years past. The article states: "The number of airmen during each year, including all others as well as the licensed pilots, works out pretty closely to five in 1908; 50 in 1909; 500 in 1910; 1,500 in 1911, and 5,800 in 1912. "Now, making a few simple deductions from the foregoing data, it is easy to calculate that in 1908 there was a fatality for each thousand miles of flight; in 1909, one for each 7,000 miles; in 1910, one for each 20,000 miles; in 1911, one for each 30,000 miles; and, in 1912, one for each 107,000 miles. It is equally evident that in 1908, one in five of the airmen were killed; in 1909, one in 12; in 1910, one in 17; in 1911, one in 20, and in 1912, one in 51. "On the face of it, then, aviation has consistently and rapidly improved in safety from year to year, until now it is at least ten times as unlikely to kill a person engaged in it as it was in 1908. And in spite of this reduced danger per individual, there is a still greater reduction of danger per unit of mileage, 107,000 miles of flight being now accomplished with the same toll of human life that only four years ago was paid for each thousand miles. "Yet ninety-nine persons out of every hundred are impressed with the idea that aviation, which had killed less than half a dozen individuals four years ago, has grown into something terribly dangerous, when, as a matter of fact, aviation commenced as something very hazardous and has developed already into something fully 99 per cent less risky until now a flight in an aeroplane is far safer than a ride in a racing automobile, and is only about as hazardous as participation in a football game, which, for numbers and time of individuals engaged, rolls up substantially and equal fatality list."

EMBROIDERY AIDS.

Experts in embroidery work realize that it is necessary to use embroidery hoops and frames for the smallest piece of work if they would keep it smooth. They also keep the stitches from drawing and are as assistants when shading with colored silks, in allowing the embroiderer to observe the light and shadow on the silk when held against the material. Sets of hoops of assorted sizes can be bought for a few cents apiece, says the Philadelphia North American. One hoop in the set is a little larger than the other, but in order to hold the work firmly in the frame you must wrap each with narrow strips of muslin or some soft cotton material until one hoop fits very closely over the other. The fabric to be worked is arranged by placing it over the smaller hoop; then, drawing it smooth and even, the large hoop is pressed firmly down over it so as to hold the goods with an even tension without straining it. If the work is too large for the hoop you are using, finish one portion of the design before changing the work in the hoop, and keep the unfinished portion pinned in a neatly folded roll while you are working. For very heavy work or embroidery on heavy material, a plain picture frame, or the frame of an old slate, will do nicely to stretch the work over. The edges of the material can be heated over the frame, or if the material is a little too small to allow for this, you can sew over and over the frame, catching the stitches into the material as you work, drawing them tight. This must be done with heavy linen thread that will not break or stretch. The wise housekeeper selects a dry place in the kitchen or pantry to store her groceries.
