PRAYING FOR RAIN. MAHONE BAY, August 22.—Mahone Bay tonight is praying that the wind will not shift and that rain will shortly fall. At present, so long, as the wind stays south easterly, there is no immediate danger here or at Martin's Point Gold River or any of the other settlements where forest fires are threatening. If a shift of wind comes, however, or rain does not fall the situation will be critical in the extreme. There was a hard frost at Gold River today. Several times the railway bridge was on fire but each time the blaze was extinguished. Albert Young's house also caught but was saved. Large contingents of men are out fighting the fires at various points, and the party of Chester Americans are still doing yeoman service.
