THE NEED OF REPETITION.

It would be such comfort if one sermon, or even a dozen sermons, could finally settle the fate of the liquor traffic and kindred evils. It would pay to spend a year, or even ten years, on the preparation of such sermon or sermons. But we find that it is not so. The battles of truth are won. It is the constant "pegging away" which tells, and there seems very often to be no really decisive stroke. How often one hears a parent say to a child, "Now, I don't want to tell you this again!" And yet there are things which the father heard forty years ago which he has not quite learned even yet. We get out of patience with children because they forget so easily, but there are few of us who do not share the same fault. Even the teachers need teaching, and sometimes they seem even less mindful than the scholars whose slowness they deplore. Every man and woman who aspires to teach man needs both patience and faith. The slowness of the pupil must be met by unwearied patience on the

part of the teacher. Only thus can the work be done. But this patience seems possible only to men of unbending faith. The man whose vision takes in only the apparent failure of himself and his predecessors will grow discouraged, and will probably give up the task, or prosecute it in such a hopeless spirit as to render success impossible. Every teacher and preacher needs to realize that this slowness of learning is not peculiar to his life or work, nor even to our age. It is a characteristic of all races and of all ages. And we do well to remember that it is in this way the race has learned what it now knows. We need the tiresome iteration, but this iteration is effective. We forget easily and we forget much, but we do not forget all. A little of the lesson is permanently learned, and this is what counts. The acquisition of knowledge is slow, but it is constantly progressing. This is the fact which the true teacher must always bear in mind. Much of what he says men will forget, but the little which they remember may transform their lives, and give the race a permanent uplift.

ANOTHER FLYING FATALITY

LONDON, May 13—Victor Louis Mason, an American identified with extensive interests was killed today while making a flight at Brooklands with the English aviator E. V. Fisher. Fisher also was killed out of the machine at a height of about 150 feet. Fisher was about to give an exhibition and picked up Mr. Mason as a passenger from among the spectators. They circled the track once when, eye-witnesses say, the monoplane made an abrupt turn. It wavered a moment and then fell straight to the earth. The sudden stoppage in the air threw Fisher headlong from his seat. Mason was pinned beneath the wreckage, which caught fire, and he was badly burned before being extricated. Physicians state that both men died almost instantly.

MRS. ASTOR'S PRESTIGE! ENGAGEMENT REPORTED.

NEW YORK, May 9—Altho Mrs. Astor has announced her intention of herself to be a resident of England and has announced her intention of sending her daughter Muriel abroad, no intimation has come as to when she will start back to London. Will Mrs. Astor's Willing Astor try to resume her place in society here and become the recognized feminine head of the Astor family? Had Col. Astor lived, it is probable that his bride eventually would have been accepted in his set as a leader. But as the colonel died before she could establish in that position, and as before her marriage she starred on tennis courts rather than in ballrooms, it is considered doubtful whether she can ever become the social celebrity that she surely would have become had her husband lived. With Mrs. Astor's Willing Astor conditions are different. But barriers exist against her ever becoming a society leader, as well as against the youthful Mrs. Astor. For while for years she had the prestige of being Col. Astor's wife, she forfeited much of that prestige when she divorced him. It is admitted that she has beauty, dignity, social experience and diplomacy. But there is something missing in the list of qualities, they insist, and altho none are willing to define just what that something is, they still declare that without it neither she nor any other woman can hope to occupy the late Mrs. William Astor's throne. Interest in the affairs of Mrs. Astor's Willing Astor was heightened today by a report called from Paris that she is engaged to marry Maurice Rostand, a brilliant young man, who the second son of Edmund Rostand, poet and author of "Chanticleer," Mr. Astor, who is secluded at the Fitz-Carroll, would not comment upon the report. As young Rostand is just about the age of her son Vincent, little credence is attached to the rumor. In fact, it bears all the earmarks of a zealous press agent engaged to keep the name of Rostand from sharing the fate of the modest violet.

LIBRARY FOR MONCTON.

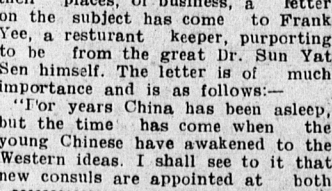

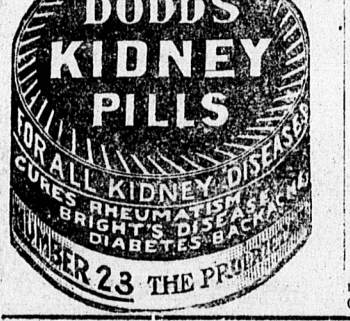

NFLD. PULP CONCERN FED FLOUR TO HORSES.

NORTH SYDNEY, May 9—It is stated that the horses employed at the big pulp concerns in Newfoundland have not had a feed of oats for two months, and that during that period 150 to 200 barrels of flour have been consumed by the animals, the story goes. Although a large quantity of oats and other fodder was stored in the autumn, it was found inadequate, owing to the unexpectedly long blockade of transportation.



TO IMPROVE AGRICULTURE.

CHICAGO, May 12—A movement to put a County agriculturist in all the Counties of every State, to make a study of local conditions and suggest plans of scientific farm management for the purpose of obtaining a larger yield of letter grain, received impetus today with the announcement of a gift of \$1,000,000 from a Chicago firm to further the plan.

RELATIONS WITH GERMANY.

NEW YORK, May 13—A cable to the New York Times from London says:—"The Daily Telegraph's Vienna correspondent in connection with the accepted belief that Baron Marschall Von Bieberstein is coming to London on a private mission from the Kaiser, sends two and a half columns of Anglo-German relations, wherein he recounts certain pages of modern history for which he had access to documents of unquestionable importance. With this authority Baron Friedrich Van Holstein, who for more than thirty years was head of the political department of the German Foreign Office, and who was regarded during that time as "The Power behind the Throne." The evidence, upon which the correspondent's assertions rest is supplied by a series of letters written by Baron Von Holstein which the correspondent recently had opportunity of reading.
