Campaign Gems

The divine right of King to rule, and the divine fore-knowledge of Robb in predicting results, will get as rude a smash on September 14th, as the Kaiser's "Me und Gott" got in 1918.

Liberals are laboring to convince voters that the whole Duncan report was published. And so it was—but Josephine's Diary, and some other little nervous details of evidence were, by what is called "a gentleman's agreement," hid under a bushel.

Dunning says—"There are no Tories in Canada," that species of the genus hope is a relic of the past. He was almost right, but every rule has its exception. There is the Right-Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King—in his divine right to rule, a Tory of the Tories.

Liberals pretend to believe that their party will win on September 14th, in their manoeuvres to get Progressives elected out West, by combining to avoid the solid proof that they haven't the slightest confidence in what they preach.

Mr. Dunning said—"I do wish the United States were not so thirsty; it would make our smuggling problem easier." The evidence in the customs probe suggests a wish that some Liberal heeler were not so thirsty in our home land; it would materially help us out in our smuggling problem.

The demand for stable government can only be met by giving Mr. Meighen a substantial majority over all parties on Sept. 14th. See to it by your labor and your votes that he gets a rousing one.

Mr. Robb (per Patriot, page 1, col. 3) says—"Under the treaties and agreements put into effect by the Liberal administration, whereby new markets were gained, Canada was enabled to export \$59,000,000 worth of butter to the rest of the world."

But worse; oh worse. The export of butter under the Meighen government in 1921 amounted to \$5,128,831. So that Mr. Robb, by his miracle working trade treaties, succeeded in destroying one half of our butter export trade. To stretch the truth is bad enough, but to actually wipe out a full half of our butter exports is worse than bad.

"If a Canadian housewife wants a fresh egg from Australia for her husband to get it?" Hon. J. A. Robb. Not quite as long as she has to wait for the United States cold storage eggs which under the Robb tariff floods the Canadian market every late winter and early spring.

"The only intimation we had that Parliament was dissolved was from some messenger boy who told us that we couldn't get in." (Mr. C. A. Dunning). The electors will tell you the same story on September 14th.

"Let us check up this (potato) statement," says Mr. Robb. "What was the value of our potato exports? \$5,000,000 shipped to the United States last year." Wonderful (?) indeed. Under the Meighen government in 1921 we shipped \$3,324,634 worth of potatoes to the States.

Exp-Ansive Minister Robb, and his leader, Hon. Mackenzie King, are putting up some big boasts over the reduced auto duty. This couple were not always so enthusiastic on this subject. It was only one year earlier that they were in the very act of boasting about their trade treaty with Australia.

A SHALLOW ARGUMENT The Hon. Mr. Robb pointed to the fact that the customs revenue in 1926 was \$22,000,000 greater than under the Meighen government; in 1922 to prove that Hon. Dr. Martin was wrong in placing the loss of revenue, by smuggling, at from \$30,000,000 to \$40,000,000. That cock won't fight. Mr. Robb was in the very act of boasting about our trade expansion, and he knew that dutiable goods to the value of about \$100,000,000 had been imported in excess of that of 1922, on which duty was paid, to more than account for his twenty two millions. The imports of autos alone, and of agricultural implements (under their Progressive duty reduction), was more than doubled, the excess duty revenue on which would nearly wipe out his boasted difference. He seems to have forgotten that there is a certain class of talkers who particularly need to have a good memory.

Amongst the bluff arguments used by the Hon. Mr. Robb, in the Strand we find the boast that since their trade treaty with Australia came in force, in one year, "we have sold \$13,000,000 worth of goods for every three (\$3) dollars worth we brought in from that country."

The unsuspecting this looked fine, from a surface catch-point. But before that treaty came in force we sold to Australia \$19,223,997 worth of goods, while we only imported from them \$1,037,451 or less than ten cents (10c) for each H. D. Jeffery, Boston.
