CURRY MEAT LOAF
A really good meat loaf and by "good" neither too moist nor too dry and above all tasty. It is hard to beat. It is a thrifty dish, usually good hot or cold or in sandwiches. This curry meat loaf from the consumer section rates four stars on every count. To make it soak one cup of bread cubes in 1/2 cup of milk and beat with a fork until bread is broken up. Add one egg and continue beating until light. Add one teaspoon of celery salt, 1-8 teaspoon of pepper and 1 1/2 teaspoons of curry powder. Combine with one pound of ground meat, 1/4 cup of chopped onion, 1-2 cup of grated raw carrot and one teaspoon of vinegar. Pack into a lightly greased loaf tin and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees Fahrenheit, for about one hour, basting several times during the cooking with a small amount of French dressing.
