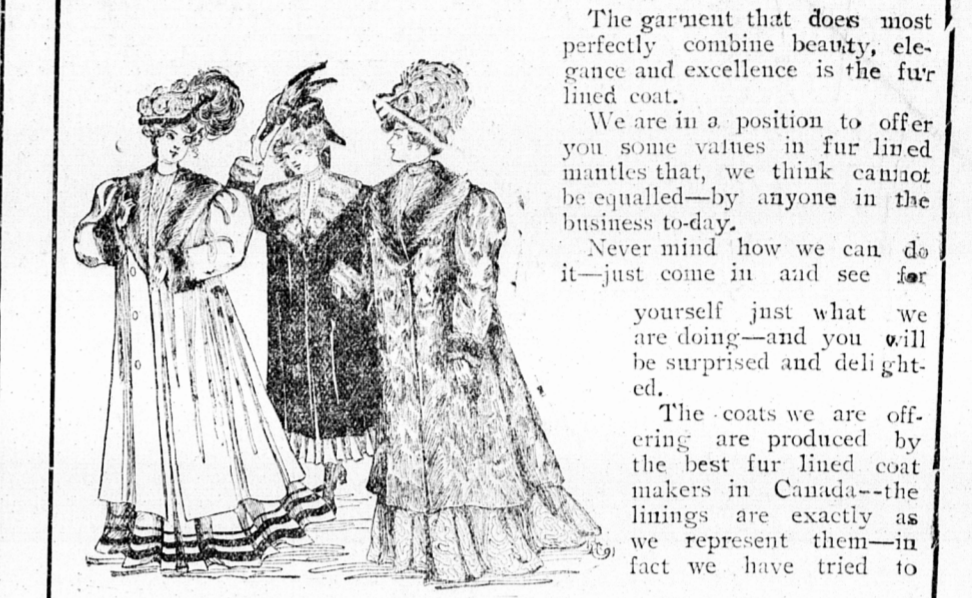

The amount realized was in the vicinity of two hundred dollars. The schooners Albert P. and Lochiel have arrived with full cargoes of St. John lime in casks and barrels for L. M. Poole & Co., Connoily's west wharf. Augustus McLeod at the City Police Court yesterday received two months imprisonment for throwing a dish at his daughter's head, inflicting a severe wound.
