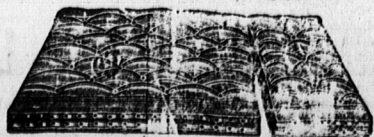

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL.

WE read of contracts being let for construction work on the Transcontinental Railway in the west, while little or nothing seems to be doing on the eastern section between Quebec and Moncton, the surveys having been suspended before they were completed. What does this mean? The terms of the statute are plain. Section 10 of the Act of 1904 concerning the National Transcontinental Railway provides that "the work of construction, shall be commenced, as nearly as may be, simultaneously at Moncton, at Quebec, at the junction of the eastern division with the branch southerly . . . and at Winnipeg, . . . in such manner that the section between Winnipeg and Quebec and between Quebec and Moncton shall be completed as nearly as practicable at the same time."

Now The Guardian has not been able to see the necessity of duplicating the Intercolonial by another Government road between Quebec and Moncton. Many persons whose judgment and motives we respect believe such duplication to be necessary and important, with the object of securing a shorter line and with more favourable grades than the Intercolonial Railway affords. But whatever differences of opinion may exist in that regard all must agree that the law ought to be carried out, or removed from the statute book. Simultaneous beginning and completion of the several sections is plainly in the mandate of Parliament. If the Moncton-Quebec section is to be built it ought now to be put under contract with the other sections. If it is not to be built the country ought to know the fact. Both the law and the country are being trifled with in this matter.

Toronto has decided to increase the pay of its police force up to the following figures: Inspectors \$1450; sergeants and detectives \$1200; first-class constables \$900; second-class constables \$800; third-class constables \$700. And the police don't do any better work in Toronto than they do right here in Charlottetown.

Captain Bernier is now in Ottawa endeavoring to induce the Government to assist his projected expedition in search of the north pole. He is a seaman of ability, enterprise and skill, experienced in arctic navigation and patriotically devoted to Canada. It would be a splendid advertisement for Canada should a Canadian explorer be the first to discover it. Captain Bernier's plan is as rational as any yet put forward for reaching the pole. Under these circumstances we would be glad if Parliament would make a reasonable appropriation to assist his enterprise.

There seems to be but little question that the Supreme Court of New Brunswick decided according to law in the case of Mabel French who applied to be admitted to the bar of that Province. The Government of the Province has now taken the matter up and introduced a bill in the Legislature to remove the disability. There is no doubt that this bill will become law, and Miss French in a few months will be admitted to the bar.

It is good for the whiskey seller, too, if he will be induced by it to change his calling, as a number in this city have done, greatly to their credit and with increased respect among their fellow citizens.
