F. J. Holman and bride, city, returning from their honeymoon, were passengers on the Northumberland Saturday afternoon.

Wm. H. Clark, second engineer of the S. S. Minto, was a passenger on the Northumberland returning to the city Saturday afternoon.

Rev. Z. L. Fash, pastor of the Baptist Church, delivered the first of a series of sermons on "Faces" last evening. The preacher took "The Face of a Man" as his first topic and based his sermon on Ezekiel 1:10. His discourse was very pointed and spiritually profitable. The remainder of the series will be eagerly followed.

At the special Evangelistic meeting in the Central Christian Church last evening a large and attentive audience listened to Rev. J. F. Floyd preach on the subjects "How do we know we are Christians," and much good is being accomplished. Mr. Floyd announced that the special meetings will be continued every night this week with the exception of Saturday night. The subject for tonight will be "How 3000 became Christians in one day." Mrs. J. S. Floyd will sing at each service. Her singing last evening was greatly enjoyed by the large congregation.

A Montreal exchange says—E. B. Boreham, manager of the North American Life Assurance Co., has been appointed manager of the Imperial Securities Co., of Montreal, and will come here January 1st, the company having arranged to open offices on St. James street. Mr. Boreham has been prominent in the Life Assurance world of Canada, having been a vice-president of the Dominion Association of Life Underwriters and also vice-president of the Toronto Life Underwriters Association. He went to Toronto from Nova Scotia two years ago, where he was manager for some years for the Mutual Life of Canada. The Imperial Securities Co. is a recently formed bond and investment concern with influential backing. (The Mr. Boreham referred to is a native of Halifax and has a number of relatives in this City.)

On Saturday afternoon Port Warden H. Pope Welsh held a survey on the schooner Abbie C. Stubbs of New York to assess the damage sustained on the morning of the eighteenth inst. at two o'clock when she was run down by the schooner Arclight. The damaged vessel had a considerable portion of her starboard rail torn away besides her stanchions, bulwarks, and chain work and also some of her rigging. The Stubbs was lying at anchor outside the harbor when the accident occurred, having put into the bay for shelter. After the accident she came into the harbor and anchored in the stream, and about four o'clock Saturday afternoon was taken to Pownal wharf by the tug William Aitken where she now lies to effect the necessary repairs before going to sea again. She is owned in New York and was bound from Shediac to Cuba heavily laden with lumber. Her Captain is A. L. McLean of Boston. When seen by a Guardian representative, Capt. McLean stated that the fault of the collision lay with the Arclight. This schooner was loaded by Carvell Bros with produce to the value of \$2,000 for St. Pierre and at that time was just commencing her journey. In the collision the Arclight had her headgear and bowsprit carried away. She then proceeded on her course and later went ashore at Belle River. The tide was high at the time and she is left well up on the shore and at present lies on even keel. The crew are standing by their vessel and are engaged in salvaging the cargo, an operation which will not be completed until tomorrow. An effort will be made to float her. Harbor Master John White went to the scene of the disaster Saturday. The Arclight is under command of Capt. Poole of North Sydney, was built in 1898 and is of 103 tons.

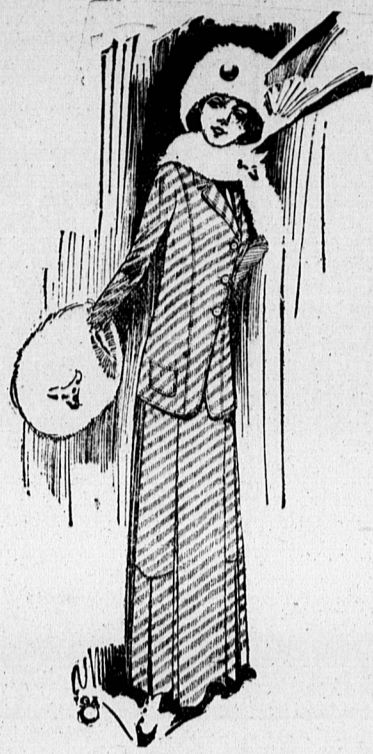

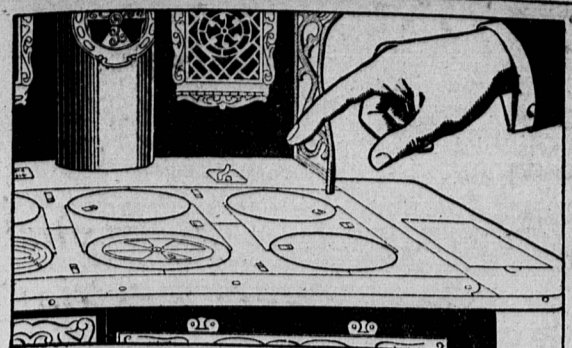
