Expecting Larger Potato Crop Than Last Year

According to Mr. S. O. Poppo, District Fruit and Vegetable Inspector, the Island potato crop this year, despite the recent hot dry spell, should be larger than last year. While the average yield per acre last year was 140 bushels, this year should be close to 175 bushels. Mr. Poppo stated that not so much as in this time last year, the weather attributes to this fact to the unusual number of sunny days and dewless nights. Damp, moist weather, assists in the sprouting of the spores which carry the blight from plant to plant and from field to field.

Bush Fires In Ontario

There are certain viruses which are becoming more widely known in the present state of affairs. It is very hard to control. Virus X, for instance, is present in all North American potato stock but of itself not especially harmful. However, should this virus form an association with virus A, for example, the result on a potato plant would be disastrous. Mr. Poppo said.
