5 EX-SERVICE MEN INCLUDED IN CABINET

Bennett's Ministry Has
Wide and Varied Ex-
perience—Four Of
Quintette Served In
C. E. F.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 14.—Of the
fifteen ministers comprising Pre-
mier Bennett's cabinet, five are ex-
-service men—almost one third of the
entire ministry. Wide and varied
have been their experiences, ranging
from the battle-front of Northern
France to the frozen wastes of Siberia.
Four of this quintette were offi-
cers in the Canadian expeditionary
force, and one achieved the distinc-
-tion of becoming a sergeant, as-
-cending the grade from the lowly

Wednesday's Traffic Fatality Found "Unavoidable" Though Car Driver's Brakes Were Not In Good Condition—Inquest Concluded Last Night.

"We the jurymen empanelled to inquire into the death of Doreen Carver on August 12, 1930, at or near the corner of Euston and Hill-sboro streets in this city find her death was due to being struck by a car driven by Claud Ives.

"While we believe his brakes were not in good condition we find the accident in this case was not due to this fact, but was unavoidable. We would strongly suggest, however, that provision be made for a Provincial Inspector of Cars—their brakes and equipment, and also the ability of the car drivers."

The above was the finding of the coroner's jury at the inquest into the death of Doreen Carver, which was concluded before Coroner Houston last evening.

Miners Battle To Help Mates

PITHEAD, Blakeburn Mine, Blakeburn, B. C. Aug. 14.—Sweating coal-miners in gas masks toiled tirelessly tonight in the depths of the Blakeburn Mine, seeking to free forty-six workers trapped in the gas filled shaft. Through 2,600 feet of shaft passage, blocked by an explosion late yesterday, the rescue crew has battled past cave-in after cave-in. Somewhere in the remaining 1,000 feet of mine tunnel are the entombed men, imprisoned as they were almost at the end of their afternoon shift labor yesterday.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS IN OTTAWA

Situation At Present
Not Regarded By
Health Officers As
Alarming.

paralysis has broken out in the Cap-
-ital, but the situation is not regarded
by health officers as alarming. To-
-day it was reported two cases have
been isolated and treated with anti-
-paralysis serum. An epidemic of the
disease early last fall reached serious
proportions in Ottawa.

Gallant, 17, formerly of Summerside,
was sent up for trial at the next term
of the Supreme Court by Mr. D. Ed-
-gar Shaw, K. C., Chief Magistrate
for Queens County at the conclusion
of the preliminary hearing yesterday.

It appeared by the evidence that
at the time of the entrance of the
store the proprietor and family were
absent at an ice cream festival at
Highfield Rink. The accused had
borrowed the admission fee to the
rink from another young man, it was
alleged, and later on in the evening
he was seen spending money and
treating his friends. Another circum-
-stance was the finding of a car num-
-ber book in the possession of the ac-
-cused. The book had been in the
shop on the night previous to the
breaking.

Progress Of The R-100

LONDON Aug. 14.—The British
Air Ministry received its first
wireless message from the home-
-ward bound R-100 today, giving its
position at noon Greenwich Meri-
-dian time, one a. m. eastern standard
time as nearing Belle Isle. The
weather was fine and clear. The
R-100 informed the Ministry that
she was averaging a speed of 50
knots in a wind of ten miles an
hour. She was flying along at a
height of 1,500 feet. At the time of

her report, the R-100 was getting a
course for Belle Isle over which she
was later reported heading out to
sea.

ST. HUBERT AIRPORT, Que.

-mately 600 miles south east of Belle
Isle. The ship sent the following wire

AFRIDS REPULSED

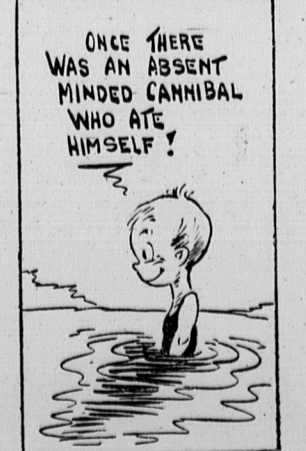
SIMLA, India, Aug. 14.—From

been beaten back. The threatened
tribal attack on Kohat has not
materialized. The marauding bands
on Peshawar apparently had with-
-drawn. Intelligence reports indicate
that three villages are pursuing
their normal peaceful activities.

23,000 IDLE

BOMBAY, India, Aug. 14.—Two
hundred textile workers became
idle today through closing of the
Khimex Mill, the first to be affect-
-ed of a group of twenty-four Euro-
-pean managed cotton mills on the
All India National Congress War
Council boycott list. Twelve mills
have now closed, making idle 23-
-000 workers.
