BOY KEEPS MOTHER'S SKELETON

PARIS, July 3. (British United Press)-For more than three months an 11 year old boy successfully concealed the death of his mother and took advantage of his new freedom to indulge in mischief that finally attracted police authorities. When they sought him out at his home, they found the skeleton of his mother in a bedroom. For some time the neighbour, Madame Casac, who lived in a small house with her only child had not seen her. On questioning the boy they learned that his mother was ill and unable to receive visitors. Kind friends offered him food to take to his mother, and, realizing that he must be lacking care invited him to meals. Meanwhile, he ceased to attend school and his mischievous conduct came to attention of the police. They were met by the boy who said that his mother was too ill to see them. Disregarding his protests, they entered. On a bed they found the skeleton of Madame Casac. The boy then confessed that his mother had died of consumption three months ago.

DEATH OF LIFE LONG RESIDENT OF FREETOWN

There passed away on Tuesday at the age of 84 years, one of the oldest residents of Freetown, Mr. Artemas Burns. He was born and lived on the old homestead of his father, the late Andrew Burns, living with his sister-in-law, Mrs. Burns and his niece, Miss Burns. He was unmarried.

Mr. Burns was the last of his family. He was the son of the late Artemas Burns, who passed away two years ago. Mr. Burns will long be remembered in the district for his many fine qualities. He was a successful farmer and a splendid neighbor. In his earlier days he took an active interest in community life and was generous in all his dealings and an outstanding man in every field of endeavor. He was a staunch Liberal and an adherent of the Presbyterian Church. When the church where he had always attended turned United, Mr. Burns joined them as he was loathe to leave the church he had attended for so many years. The Guardian extends sincere sympathy to Mrs. Burns and Miss Burns in their bereavement. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon from his residence to North Bedeque Cemetery, Rev. Mr. Nicholson officiating. Interment was in the family plot. The pall bearers were Messrs. Frank Deacon, George Paynter, W. M. Stavert, J. N. Profit, Calvin T. Reeves and Abijah Burns.-S
