McLeod, Nicholson and James, Elders.

Minutes of meetings of May Ninth, and Thirtieth, being in the hands of members, were held as read and sustained.

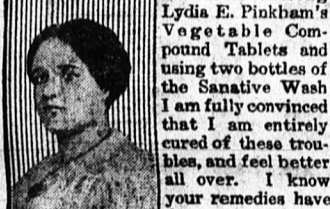
