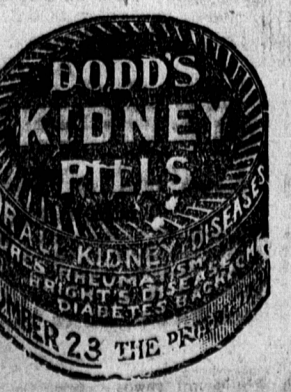
Ladies' outer and under garments are still proving an attraction and there are also good bargains yet left in furniture and the sale will continue until the large stock is disposed of.

(Special to the Guardian.) TORONTO, Aug. 16.—Moderate winds, mostly west and south, fine and warm.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was clear and beautiful, clear at night. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 81 degrees above zero and the lowest was 65 above. The lowest the previous night was 56 above. At nine a.m. it was 70 above and at nine p. m. 65 above.

The tide will be high this morning at 9.51, tomorrow at 10.44 and Monday at 11.32; it will be high tonight at 11.33, tomorrow at 12 and Tuesday morning at 12.33.

The sun sets this evening at 7.09 and tomorrow at 7.08 and Monday at 7.06; it rises tomorrow morning at 5.01, Monday at 5.02 and Tuesday at 5.04.

The moon rises this evening at 7.29 and Sunday at 7.46. The first quarter of the moon was on Saturday, Aug. 9th at 12.03 a. m.

The moon will be full Saturday, Aug. 16th at 4.37 p. m.

The length of day will be fourteen hours and nine minutes and of tomorrow fourteen hours and seven minutes.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(Special).—Sir Edward Grey spoke reassuringly on the European situation in the Commons yesterday. The concert of Europe, he said, was a reality, and, though the powers were not unanimous in their views, they were not arranged in different camps, and disconcert was unlikely.

The Foreign Minister is not optimistic enough to overlook possibilities of future trouble. For the present, however, the conflagration has burnt itself out, and the Ambassadors who have been visiting London could take a needed holiday with easy minds.

LONDON, August 14 (Special).—It often happens—your sore corn is important naval secrets will fall into Japan is afraid that one of her most the hands of a rival power thru the loss of a torpedo from the new battleship Kongo on her trip recently off the Irish coast.

The Japanese government has offered a reward of \$10,000 for the recovery of the torpedo. This is five times the amount usually offered by the British government in similar circumstances. The explanation according to the Pall Mall Gazette is that the torpedoes of the Kongo are unique in construction, and that they embody unusual secrets of construction. The newspaper says that the torpedo has a much longer range and is more deadly than the newest style of British torpedo. It is said to be propelled by engines worked by heated air, generated by a spirit, the composition of which is the discovery of Japanese scientists and unknown to the outside world. The Kongo is believed to be the only battleship in the world carrying such a projectile.

A fishing fleet is searching Belfast Lough for the torpedo in the hope of earning the unusually large reward. WILLERSTAD, Aug. 9 (Special).—It is heard here that General Leon Jurado, Governor of the Venezuelan State of Falcon, who was believed to have been taken prisoner by General Castro's adherents when they captured the town of Coro, is marching from the State of Lara to attack the rebels.

MOJI, Aug. 12 (Special).—Dr. Sun Yat-sen, formerly Provisional President of the Chinese Republic, arrived here yesterday from the island of Formosa. He is travelling incognito. In reply to an inquiry he declared he had not yet decided whether he would remain in Japan or go to America.

LONDON, Aug. 14 (Special).—The publication of a photograph led to the discovery of pellagra in England within the last month in July the photograph of a boy victim of pellagra under treatment at St. Thomas' hospital, appeared in a medical journal, and since then doctors in various parts of the country reported cases of the disease.

Symptoms which had been very puzzling to them were explained by the photograph. BERLIN, Aug. 14 (Special).—The insinuation of slander proceedings against Editor Wassman of a weekly publication in Frankfurt-on-the-Main, made a great stir recently, for he had attacked the city hospital and waged a warfare against Professor Ehrlich, the discoverer of "Salvarsan."

man charged that the women of Frankfurt's underworld had been forcibly seized and taken to city hospitals and there forcibly treated with Ehrlich's remedy against their wishes. The editor charged further that these women had been used as "experimental guinea pigs," with the result that many of these unfortunate had become blind, while others had been permanently paralyzed, their legs and arms rendered useless. He alleged that a total of fifteen deaths had occurred as a result of these experiments.

Wassman wrote a letter to Ehrlich, in which he asked if the professor knew what was being done, and he approved of it. The editor received no answer, but an action for slander was brought, which now has been suddenly dropped.

MEXICO CITY, (via Galveston, Texas, Aug. 12 (Special).—John Lind reached this city at eight o'clock tonight, accompanied by Dr. Bayard Hale. He left Vera Cruz at six o'clock in the morning. Mr. Lind was greeted by Dr. O'Shaughnessy. There were no demonstrations.

President Huerta reviewed a parade of some two thousand persons from the balcony of the National Palace this morning. The manifestation was in support of the government's attitude in the Lind incident. After the review he held a conference with Cabinet Minister Gamboa and Deputy Jose Hira Lozano. After the conference Mr. Gamboa denied the reports in circulation that he had refused the portfolio of Foreign Relations, saying he would take the oath of office at noon tomorrow. He also declared unfounded, and absurd the report published in a local newspaper that he was to be made provisional President while General Huerta resigns to go before the people at the next election for the office of President. Mr. Gamboa said that Mr. Lozano had been named Minister of Public Instruction, Manuel Garza Aldape being moved to Fomento and relinquishing temporary charge of the Foreign Office. It is learned from high authorities that Enrique Goretsteta, a member of the National Senate, from Monterey, will probably be the new Minister of Finance.

Today's demonstration was orderly. There were no speeches or anti-American features. It was not as large as had been expected and few of the professional element participated.

LONDON, Aug. 14 (Special).—Scotland Yard is investigating the mysterious Prince Alexander of Battenburg's jewel case, the contents of which were valued at \$25,000 and which was lost on Saturday between Rise Hall, near Hull, where he had been stopping, and Doncaster, on his return.

The jewels consist of two sets of sleeve links set with diamonds, pearls and sapphires; five tie pin sets, and four jewelled studs.
