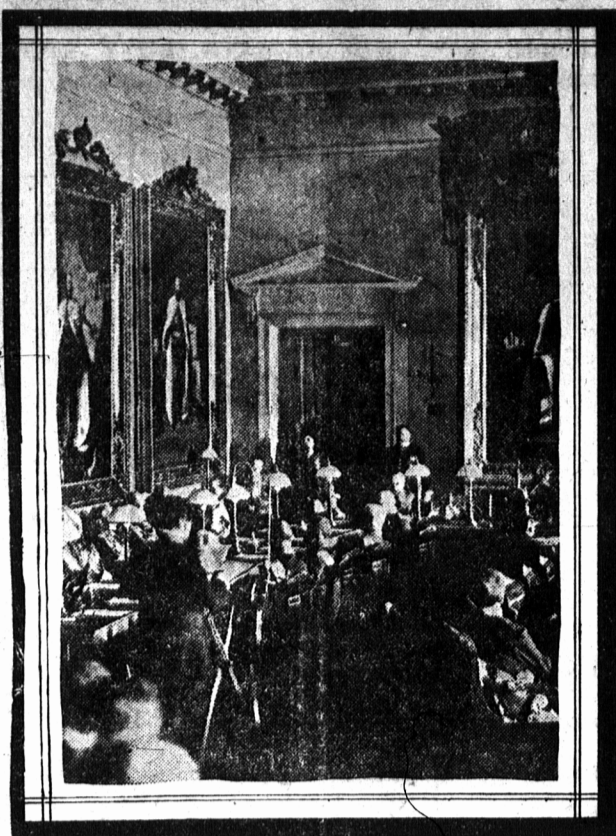

## CANADIAN OFFICER ARRIVES HOME AGAIN

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 4—Captain Thacker, who was the Canadian military attache with Oku's army, and witnessed the actions at Anshan, Liao Yang and Shaho, arrived on the steamer Empress of Japan this morning. He was invalided after the battle of Shaho.

When he left, the two armies, each being reinforced steadily, were entering and strengthening their position, preparing for battle, which the Japanese proposed to give when the Port Arthur army was released, augmenting the Japanese forces so that they will be much larger than the Russian, and capable of giving a crushing blow.

Describing the battle of Liao Yang, Capt. Thacker said the Russian position, which he investigated after the battle, was most strong, having a circle of eleven redoubts

extending all around from the Ta'iseho river on one side to the river on the other side, and well made trenches intervening. It is a source of cheer, however, to know that about two-thirds of the world are under Christian Governments.
