TRIED TO KILL FRANCIS JOSEPH

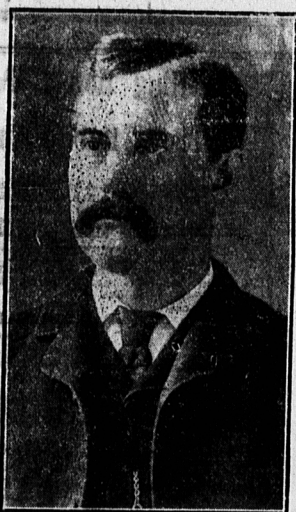
The Aged Emperor Escapes Unhurt at Klagenfurt From a Would-be Assassin, Said to Be an Austro-Italian.

MORE TRAGEDIES PEAKS OF ALPS

INNSBRUCK, Sept. 4.—From particulars received here of the fatal accident to the Turin architect named Kind and the Vienna tourist named Weber on the Pizzo Bianco, it appears that both mountaineers who had been staying at Sils Maria, had slept on Sunday night at the Tschleria hut and started without guides on Monday morning to make the ascent of Pizzo Bianco, which is considered to be a very dangerous feat.

A WARNING TO ANGRY MOTHERS

CHEBOYGAN, Mich., Sept. 3.—Mrs Fred Williams, living at Bear Point, on Crooked Lake, near this City, was severely injured, and her seven year old son was probably fatally hurt when a dynamite cap in the boys hip pocket exploded while the mother was spanking him with a shingle for a minor offence. The first blow from the shingle exploded the cap in the boys pocket and the explosion tore a large hole in the boys hip, from which he is believed to be dying. The mother lost two fingers and received a number of minor cuts about her face and body.

Coroner Johnston will call expert witnesses and is going to find out who was actually responsible for the terrible catastrophe.

Inspecting Engineer, came to see me with a sketch, showing that the ribs in one of the lower chords of the lowest truss of the anchor arm showed an inward side of the chord. The matter was reported the same day to the Consulting Engineer, and the Phoenix Bridge Company, but in order to avoid the delays and any misunderstanding that might arise from transmission of messages, Mr. McClure left the next morning for New York and Phoenixville to discuss the question. Soon after these interviews took place the structure suddenly collapsed. Whether the chord in question was the cause of the accident or not is at present undetermined. Personally, I did not see any immediate danger. At the same time I considered the question of sufficient importance to send Mr. McClure to explain the situation to the Consulting Engineer and the Phoenix Bridge Company. Before Mr. McClure left, he satisfied me as to the pier levels and line of the main post, etc. A few days previously the levels were taken for deflection, which agreed with the theoretical calculations, showing that everything was working out as it should do. If results had been otherwise the conclusions would have been that something was wrong."
