County Court Case Adjourned

The case of Oliver Campbell, Kensington, vs. Fred C. Ramsay, Montrose, which has been before the County Court at Summerside for some time, concluded the hearing of evidence yesterday before Judge L. G. Lewis and now stands adjourned till April 5th. The case is an action for \$63.00 claimed by the plaintiff to be owed to him by the defendant as an overcharge on the purchase of a bull.

At a previous hearing evidence for the plaintiff had been that he had paid the sum of \$200 for a bull purchased from the defendant at Alberton, which had been computed at the rate of ten cents a pound. It was alleged that the bull had been shipped from Alberton and eight days after had been weighed by the plaintiff and found to weigh only 1470 pounds instead of 2000 pounds claimed.

Four witnesses, including the defendant, were heard yesterday. He testified that the bull had in fact weighed 2000 pounds when weighed in Alberton and this was supported by the evidence of Claude O'Meara, who said that he had weighed the bull and the weight was 2002 pounds.

Recruiting Drive Making Progress

The current campaign for recruits for the Royal Canadian Air Force has been remarkably successful as far as this Province is concerned. It was learned yesterday from Flying Officer H. Vincent, recruiting officer of the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside. Over sixty applications have been received to date but none have actually been signed on. This is due to the fact that the applications have to be submitted to headquarters and permission received to accept them. Sixty applications in the short period since the campaign commenced is considered to be excellent and among those are a number of former service men both ex-air crewmen and ex-trademen.

The procedure for enlistment is as follows: A prospective recruit writes to the recruiting officer at the Summerside Station, who sends him an application form. When the application form is received back at the Station and it is found that the applicant appears to have the necessary qualifications he is called in for an interview, and given a medical examination and aptitude tests. If he is found satisfactory, authority is sought to enlist him. All the applications received so far are on their way through this routine and it is expected that in a few days announcement will be made that some have been signed on. S
