FORBES FIELD, Pittsburgh, Oct. 5.—In a close and exciting but also considerably below the standard for either team the New York Yankees wrested a 5-4 victory from an erratic crew of Pittsburgh Pirates today in the opening game of the 1927 World's Series. A colorful crowd of close to 42,000 jamming Forbes Field to the edges, came out to see a battle of Yankee siege guns and Pirate shrapnel but its expectations were completely upset. Instead, they saw Babe Ruth lead the Yankee attack with singles in the first and second innings. The Pirates defence crack wide open in the third inning to permit the American League champions to gain a commanding lead, and witnessed the bombardment of the rival right-handed pitching ace, Waite Hoyt and Ray Kremer, into retirement. The Pirates outthrew the Yankees 9 to 6. They constantly threatened Hoyt and finally drove him from the box in the 8th inning. But game as he was, Hoyt pitched his cap in the ninth fight, the corsairs own mistakes plus Kremer's wild game in the third inning, Wiley Moore and his "sinker ball" came to the rescue in the eighth as Hoyt was fast weakening, and checked hopes by retiring Earl Smith with a single. There were two out in the eighth when Joe Harris drove in Glen Wright with the fourth Pirate run, but Moore, big and ungainly, hitched his trousers, adjusted his cap and tossed one that Smith smacked at Lou Gehrig's glove for the first Pittsburgh hit. The end of the game was a bitter dose of defeat for the Pirates to take though they had no one to blame but themselves.

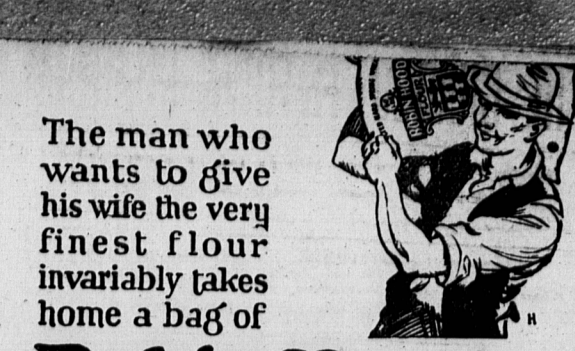
**PLAN FOR TOUR**
