serted in your shoes, or wear some

of those elastic foot bands that slip

around your arch, under your stock-

ings. They do show some, under your

stockings, but wear them when you

aren't going out and those hours of

comfort will help you all the time.

Last, foot exercises, those that

open up the unused muscles of the

foot, are well worth learning. Wriggle

your toes and move your feet

over to where they rest on their

outsoles when you sit still reading.

These are excellent exercises.
