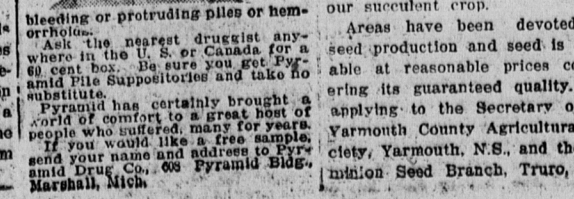

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—Although the marketing of live hogs has not been heavy for the season of the year a weaker feeling prevailed in the situation throughout the week on account of the fact that the demand from outside sources has fallen off considerably, consequently supplies have been sufficient to meet the local requirement at the different centres. At Winnipeg and Calgary prices closed 75c per 100 lbs. lower than a week ago, selected lots in the former markets selling at \$13 and in the latter one at \$13.25 per 100 lbs. Fat and watered while in the Toronto market prices declined 50c to 150 per 100 lbs. to \$13.75 to \$14, and in the Montreal market they closed 50c to 75c per 100 lbs. lower at \$16 weighed off cars.

A good steady trade continues to be done in smoked meats for the season of the year, and the market on the whole is active with no change in prices to note. Sales of 8 to 10 lbs. hams were made at 35c per lb., 10 to 15 lbs. at 33c to 34c, and 18 to 25 lbs. at 32 to 33c. Breakfast bacon sold at 32c to 40c per lb. and Windsor selected home-made hams at 51c to 53c. The trade in trimmed loins of fresh pork has been good at 35c per lb. and in trimmed shoulders at 26c to 28c per lb.

Chicago, Feb. 24.—Provisions were earlier early on selling by commission houses on an outside order, but made moderate recoveries because of the strength in cereals. Prices closed 10c to 25c lower. Future quotations were: Open High Low Close Mess pork, per bbl.—
