## Among The Farmers

### Federation Of Agriculture News

**POTATO SITUATION**

Figures released on October 10th show an increase of nearly 16 million bushels in the American potato production over the September estimate. Those figures change the outlook somewhat on our potato markets.

U. S. producers are getting terrific yields in the "late states" especially in Maine where harvesting is now well under way.

Production figures on the Island and New Brunswick are also increased, but prices are unsteady and slow. New Brunswick shipments across the border have been heavy lately although they have had considerable trouble with blight in Katharines and Mount-ains. Potato growers should be very careful not to ship any potatoes, whether seed or tablestock, if there is the slightest suspicion of blight infection.

Such practices not only injure one's reputation as an individual producer with the shippers, but the general reputation of Island potatoes on export markets is at stake. Large quantities of those tubers go south where they have to be held in warm storages which will develop this blight rapidly.

A great deal of new interest has been stirred up by our advertising program among the American buyers. But, knowing that a surplus of seed and indications are that the demand will strengthen gradually. The general price for tablestock has apparently levelled out at around eighty cents per seventy-five pound bag with a weak demand.

Seed prices although very unstable range from seventy five to eighty five cents a bushel at the main shipping points.

There has been considerable agitation lately for a price support policy which would tend to stabilize prices to producers this fall and give growers who can store their crop some assurance of a fair price later on in the season.

The Federation's policy is, of course, that only under sound marketing legislation can orderly marketing be developed or a permanent solution found. However, it may be that some assurance of a floor price now would tend to level prices out until a system of orderly marketing can be effected.

With this in mind a joint meeting of the Federation executive and the Provincial Potato Promotion Committee will be held within the next few days to take some definite action.

**National Cheese Week**

The cheese branch of the Dairy Industry in Canada is in rather an unpredictable position. First, we don't know how the British contract on cheese will turn out. Second, our own people, farmers included, are not eating cheese as much as they used to. They got out of the habit during the war when our cheese was being shipped overseas.

When we realize that cheese contains more digestible protein per pound than any other common food, can be bought as cheaply as almost everybody and can be procured at almost any store, etc., we wonder what the trouble is.

Perhaps we will have to take steps to make smaller cheese and do a better merchandizing job. Such problems are being investigated now.

However, with this in mind the National Dairy Council which is the Canadian organization of the dairy manufacturers is sponsoring a "National Cheese Week" in Canada from November 7th to 12th.

**Barbed Wire**

It is evident that our efforts to have the quality of barbed wire improved has borne some fruit. A survey was made in each Province and the response from the steel industry to the Canadian Federation has been most satisfactory. Two or three of the main companies have indicated that they will be in a position to manufacture heavier and pre-war standard wire after the first of the new year.

**Hogs Down**

Since last week hog prices have gone down again. Moncton quotations are \$28.75 delivered, Charlottetown \$28.00 country points or at the farm, for A's. This is the low figure which the packing fraternity has been suggesting as the equivalent of the British bacon contract.

**Honor Roll**

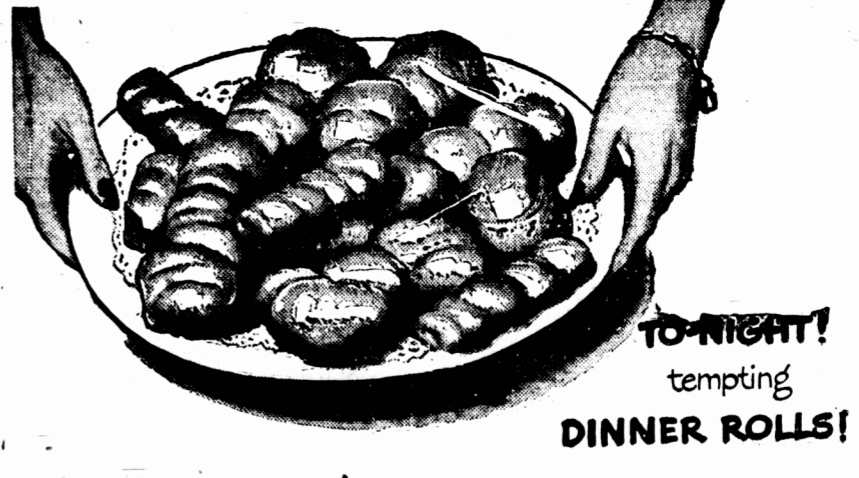

**U.S. CROP REPORT**  
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 — (AP) — The United States Agriculture Department today estimated this year's wheat crop at 1,236,226,000 bushels. This was 2,855,000 bushels less than 1,239,081,000 forecast last month and compares with the 1948 crop of 1,238,406,000 and the 10-year average (1938-47) of 991,850,000. The winter wheat estimate of 894,874,000 bushels was unchanged from a month ago and compared with 890,068,000 last year and 726,553,000 for the 10-year average.
