A. J. B. MELLISH AND THE BLACK KNIGHT.

Mr. Mellish has resumed his parable with regard to Rev. Mr. Hector's veracity. In a letter which appears in *The Patriot* of last evening he quotes extracts from the three city dailies of October 28, containing references to Mr. Hector's address of the previous evening. The strange fact with regard to the extracts quoted is that although two of them mention Eureka, South Dakota, and the third mentions South Dakota and Virginia, no one of them connects the particular story mentioned by Mr. Mellish in his previous letter with the place named. Mr. Mellish leaves his readers in no doubt as to his animus in the matter, but has so far failed to furnish a particle of legal evidence against the veracity of the Black Knight.

Why Mr. Mellish should endeavor to fasten upon Rev. Mr. Hector a charge of untruthfulness seems now to be a fitting subject for inquiry. We hope it is not because Mr. Hector is a respected minister of a church upon which his assailant has turned his back. We venture to express the hope also that his motive may not be to give aid and comfort to the rumsellers and anti-prohibitionists generally by discrediting an active and energetic platform defender of temperance. But if we exclude these causes, we shall be driven to search for the animus of his attack in professional jealousy. Mr. Hector is a lecturer and Mr. Mellish not infrequently occupies the

lectate platform. Can it be that because the white brother's audiences were not usually so large or so enthusiastic as the colored brother's, that the former has become envious?

Both Mr. Mellish and Mr. Hector have some reputation as platform story tellers—we use the compound word in its better sense. Both have related from time to time sundry of their own remarkable experiences. Different persons will place different estimates upon these stories whether the scene be located on the South African veldt or in the wild and woolly west, and whether they refer to scenes of violence in a mining region or to being blown up by a shell on the battlefield. The platform story-teller usually aims at some dramatic effect. Sometimes in the oratorical fervor of the moment he may seem to exaggerate, but most hearers treat such lapses leniently. If Mr. Mellish had, for instance, related that he was blown sky high and left the imprint of his heels upon the stellar vault, there to remain, who is there who would have written to the War Office, or called for a royal commission of astronomers to verify the fact? None of Mr. Mellish's confreres have rushed into print to challenge the accuracy of any of his wonderful experiences. Why might not Mr. Hector have been permitted to enjoy a like generous immunity?

There is still another point. Mr. Hector has made many tours in Canada and the United States, and so far as we have read or heard his character as a man and a Christian has not been impugned by any other man of moral repute. He is now assailed, behind his back and in his absence by insinuation and innuendo. If Mr. Mellish doubted the truth of any statement made by the Black Knight why did he not then and there challenge the statement and call for proof on the spot, or through the press while Mr. Hector was here? That would have been a manly and a soldierly course. That was not the course taken. Mr. Mellish probably prefers not having any public face to face discussion with Mr. Hector. From all of which a fair-minded public may draw their own conclusions.

It is given out that the Christian Scientists have decided to omit infectious and contagious diseases from their treatment. The general public will feel relieved by this announcement, but just why an infectious disease should be excepted may not logically be made to appear.

President Roosevelt is hunting bears these days. A NOTED WILL CASE.

TORONTO, November 14.—The province has entered an appeal against the judgment of Judge McMahon, declaring that the late J. A. MacLaren, of Perth made a will. MacLaren was an illegitimate son, who died, unmarried, without issue, on December 11th last, worth \$125,000. No will could be found, but John Stewart, of Perth, produced what purported to be a copy of a will, dated in June, 1897. Judge McMahon upheld this will. If he had not the estate would have gone to the province.
