The Markets

MONTREAL, July 11.—The receipts of butter for the week ending July 9th, 1921, were 19,792 packages which show an increase of 5,036 packages as compared with the previous week, and an increase of 336 packages, with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1st, 1921 to date have been 26,900 packages in excess of the same period for 1920.

The feature of the trade for the past week was the pronounced strength displayed in the market, and prices scored a marked advance which may be attributed to the continued demand for all offerings for export, local and outside account, it being reported that a large volume of business has been done with English importers for fall shipment. Another factor in the situation has been the continued excessive hot dry weather throughout the country, which may tend to curtail the make to some extent, later in the season, but up to the present it has been much larger than the same period last year. The market has been active and the latest sales reported on spot were several cars of finest creamery to outside buyers at 37c per lb., but the indications are sellers will want more money this week.

At the auction sales held here last week the total offerings were 5,810 packages, as against 5,832 packages for the previous week, and 4,400 packages for the corresponding week in 1920. The bidding at these sales was spirited and prices closed with a net advance for the week of 5 1/8c to 5 5/8c per lb., which makes a total rise since the first of June of 1 1/2c to 7 1/4c per lb., with the latest sale of pasteurized creamery at 37 3/4c per lb., finest at 36 3/4c, 58 1/8c and 57 1/2c for the same date last year. At the Isle Verte board last week 1,300 packages sold at 34 3/4c per lb., o. b., showing an advance of 4 1/2c per lb. over the previous sale and at St. Paschal 160 packages brought 35c, which was 4 3/8c per lb. higher. In sympathy with the strength here during the week, prices on the Farnham board at St. Ursula were 4 5/8c to 4 3/4c per lb., higher than a week ago, all the offerings selling at 37 1/8c to 37 1/4c per lb. o. b. the bulk at the latter figure, while at St. Hyacinthe the ruling price was 36 3/8c per lb. o. b.

Local wholesale prices for round lots were quoted as follows: Pasteurized creamery 38c to 38 1/4c. Finest creamery . . . 37c to 37 1/4c. Fine creamery . . . 36c to 36 1/4c.

The receipts of cheese for the week ending July 9th, 1921, were 80,710 boxes, which show an increase of 19,978 boxes as compared with the previous week and an increase of 11,297 boxes with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1st, 1921 to date show an increase of 44,051 boxes with the same period in 1920.

The strength which has characterized this market for the past few weeks was more pronounced than ever during the past one which was due to the active demand and keen competition between buyers for all offerings. At the boards in the country prices in some instances scored advances ranging from 2 3/8c to 3 3/8c per lb., as compared with the figures paid the previous week, and the net rise from the low level of the season has been 6c to 8c per lb. The highest price paid last week was 25 5/8c per lb. at Perth, and the lowest was 19 5/8c per lb. at St. Paschal, while other purchases were made at 21 1/2c.

The offerings at the auction sales in Montreal, July 11.—The local boxes of Ontario cheese and the net advance in prices over the previous week was 4 1/16c to 4 15/16c per lb. No. 1 white and colored at the closing sale realizing 23 5/16c per lb., and No. 2 white and colored 22 3/4c. At Gould's Cold Storage there were 16,000 boxes sold at 19c, 21c and 22c per lb., delivered here.

MONTREAL, July 11.—The local egg market was without any new features to note, prices for all grades being unchanged with a fair amount of business passing for domestic consumption when the weather conditions are taken into consideration. GATES FOR CEMETERY.

LONDON, June 21.—(By Mail)—The family of Lord Rededesdale have presented to the Imperial War Graves Commission a pair of wrought iron gates of 17th-century design, to be erected at Vierninghe Military Cemetery, near Ypres, in memory of Major the Hon. C. B. O. Mitford, D. R. O., 10th Hussars, eldest son of the late Lord Rededesdale, Major Mitford was killed in action in 1915 and was buried in this cemetery.

These gates will form the main entrance to this well-known cemetery, which is situated just behind Vierninghe Church, on the Poppeinghe-Ypres road. It contains 1,171 graves of soldiers, dating from 1914-1919, when this cemetery was closed and the New Military Cemetery was begun about a half a mile to the south.

Railway Carmen's Wages Reduced

MONTREAL, July 14.—Thirty thousand men are affected by the Railway Association of Canada and Representatives of the Locomotive Car Departments of the Canadian Railways for a reduction in the rate of wages, effective immediately of eight cents per hour. The railways involved are the C. P. R., Grand Trunk and the more important smaller Canadian railways. The agreement is signed by Grant Hall, vice president, Canadian Pacific Railway, chairman of the operating committee, representing the railways and F. J. Tallon, president division 4, Railway Employees Department A. F. of L. This tentative agreement does not prejudice pending negotiations for general revision of rates of wages and conditions of labor.
