Light With A Good Dessert

STEAMED PUDDINGS ADD
SUBSTANCE TO SLIM
FIRST COURSE

When a cool day and a slimmer-
than-usual first course happen sim-
ultaneously, that is the moment to
bring on one of the more substan-
tial type puddings which, used
chiefly in Winter, are yet so good
as to be welcome whenever they
make a reasonable appearance.

On a day when you will not mind
the steamer going, or when the oven
will be heated anyway, you may
like to give one of these puddings
to your family - they are the kind
that really know no season.

Indian Pudding

1-4 cup cornmeal
2 tablespoons sugar
1-8 teaspoon ginger
3 cups milk
1 tablespoon molasses
1-4 cup raisins, or
1-2 cup figs, dates or chopped
apples.

Butter a baking dish well, and
put in the cornmeal, Scald half
the milk and pour it over the meal,
stirring well. Add the flavorings
and the fruit, also the remaining
milk, cold. Put into a slow oven and
cook about 2 hours, stirring several
times during that time. The ginger
may be omitted if it is not liked.

Jam Roly Poly

2 cups flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 cup shortening
2-3 cup milk
1 cup jam

Mix and sift first 3 ingredients,
cut in shortening and then milk.
Roll out: 1-4 inch thick. Spread the
jam and roll. Place on a floured
plate, cover with a cloth and steam
3-4 hour. Serve with cream or
sauce.

Speed Suet Pudding

1 cup finely chopped suet
1 cup molasses
1 cup milk
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1-2 teaspoon ground ginger
1-2 teaspoon ground cloves
1-2 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup seeded raisins.

Mix the suet, molasses and milk
together. Sift the flour, salt, soda,
ginger, cloves, nutmeg and cinnam-
on together, add liquid mixture,
and lastly, raisins. Turn into a
greased mould, cover with greased
paper and steam 3 hours. Serve with
the following hard sauce:

1-2 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 tablepoons cream

Cream the butter thoroughly,
add sugar gradually and milk and
vanilla drop by drop.

Jim Roly Poly
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
1-3 cup milk
Jam

Sift together the flour, baking
powder and salt Cut in the short-
ening, which should be cold, with
a knife. Add the milk and mix to
a dough that will roll nicely. Turn
out on floured board or paper and
roll to 1-4 inch thickness. Spread
with a cupful of jam and roll up
tightly. Place on a plate, cover with
a pudding cloth and steam 3-4
hour. Serve with cream and pow-
dered sugar, or with a hot pudding
sauce.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10. (U.P.) -

Los Angeles to Seattle.

With one or two outstanding
exceptions the men who guide the
football destinies of coast universi-
ties are confirmed golf players.

Not the least enthusiastic golfing
coach is Big Bill Spaulding of the
University of California at Los An-
geles. Spaulding is a golfer of the
genial type and even refuses to get
mad if someone kids him while he
is putting.

Across the city is Howard Jones
of U. S. C., a player of the serious
school.

Long has been the golf feud be-
tween serious-minded Jones and
Joel Spaulding with honors about
even and scores averaging in the
low 80's.

Low Down On Golfing Coaches
Revealed

Spaulding, during pauses in an
18-hole foursome on a hot day at
the California Country Club gave
out some of the "low down" on the
golfing coaches.

"I believe Howard Jones does
much of his deep football thinking
from tee to green," said Spaulding.
"He takes his assistants with him.
Since coming to U. S. C., Aubrey
Devine and Sam Barry have become
potential golfers while playing with
Howard."

"How about Pop Warner up at
Stanford?" Spaulding was asked.
"Well, Pop Warner is a great
football coach," replied Spaulding.
"His good material at Stanford
Not so good as at one or two other
institutions, but give Pop a break
and he will have the team at his
feet. A great football coach is Pop
Warner."

Jimmy Phelan at Washington
University has the respect of the
other coaches as a golf opponent.
This also goes for Paul Schissler of
Oregon State, who, like his football
teams, will upset buckets at the
most unexpected times.

"Do you fear Navy Bill Ingram?"
was the next question fired at
Spaulding. "No doubt you and the
other coaches will have to play Bill,"
replied Spaulding. "Many far eastern
coaches don't go in for golf. But I
does play I hope he challenge
Pop Warner and then we will beat
a line on him. If he can't beat Pop
then the conference is safe for the
rest of us coaches."
