ROTARY

"University life in England at the opening of the present century" was the subject of an interesting address given at the Rotary luncheon yesterday by Buretz Taylor, graduate in Science at Cambridge University, England.

Mr. Taylor described the life at Cambridge which consists of about seventeen different colleges in addition to Divinity Hall and two girls' schools.

He contrasted the discipline and restrictions of school life with the freer atmosphere of university life. Academic accomplishments in the latter are more or less secondary. The main advantages are the social activities and the sports.

Character he said is mainly moulded in the schools but the influential student is more or less influenced by the fellow students he meets, men of all shades of thought and of philosophical ideas.

What is equivalent to an entrance examination in Canada is required to be taken when entering Cambridge, but if a man should fail he is allowed to remain and take the examination at the close of the term. It requires about nine terms of 59 days (or rather the number of nights in which the men sleep at the college), to win a degree.

Great stress is laid upon athletic games, mainly rowing, foot ball, and cricket, which teach among other things patience, quick thinking, judgment, accuracy and fitness.

Mr. Taylor who was an oarsman at college told how the boat races were conducted.

Other phases of university life were touched on.

Earl Baldwin and the late Viscount Grey were university men. The former said he did not do very well at university but he had profited by meeting the men he did meet. Viscount Grey who was "sent down" one year went up another year and received his degree.

At Cambridge there is an attendance of about 3,000 men at one time.

Rotarian P. W. Clarkin and James E. Harris had charge of the program the latter acting as chairman.

rest of the front sprang into action. Advice said shells screamed across the Rhine at the western fortifications all the way from Karlsruhe south to the Swiss frontier.

It was the first time the southern flank, where the Maginot and Siegfried lines are marked only by the Rhine, has been active since the first two days of the war.

The French drive into the Haardt mountains was reaching out toward the Siegfried line itself, military dispatches indicated.

The Haardt range, a continuation of the Vosges Mountains, covers a 20-mile sector between the German town of Pirmasens and the French town of Wissembourg.

The Siegfried line, which runs single in toward the frontier, is a line of concrete fortifications, the width of the no-man's land separating the main positions of the two armies.

"Active Defence"

The French attack in this area was what military men described as an "active defence".

The quick French blows, military observers said, were designed to keep the Germans so occupied they would be unable to launch the general offensive which the French have expected for several days.

Observers said the French apparently believed they had found a weak spot in the Nazi line, where the Germans feared which the difficulty of the terrain to protect the Siegfried Line.

As the French advanced their lines, advice from the front said heavy artillery was moved up behind them. French field guns were reported trained on the lines of casemates which form Germany's Military defences.

French infantry advance appeared to be more to establish artillery positions than anything else. The advance was reported to have been made to be the hill tops which could be used as artillery observation posts on the concealed plateaus. These make the best positions for gun batteries.

Fine Stallion Goes To Bay Fortune Farmer

Mr. Alexander M. McClumphaa (farmer of Bay Fortune) has purchased the three-year-old Clydesdale Stallion "Dornum Laddie" 27884 to be placed at the disposal of Island horsemen for breeding purposes during the year 1940.

The horse will replace the famous Clydesdale "Scottish Chief" lost as the result of an accident during the Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown. The horse was injured while being unloaded from a truck the day the fair opened and died the same night.

"Dornum Laddie" was imported into the province by Mr. Alexander McNeill, Southport. The horse was owned formerly by John M. Munroe of Carstairs, Alberta.

The stallion is a beautiful three year old dark bay animal with four white feet sired by the most outstanding stallion ever bred in Scotland, Craigie Winsome Imp, 26688 and his dam, Donella of Foulwood 5869, who has been an outstanding sire of champions in some of the largest show rings of Canada which is sired by the finest Clydesdale stallion Scotland ever knew, Hugo's Stamp Imp 14451. Other grand sires being Craigie Winatol, 26686, widely known by Canadian breeders.

Horse breeders in Kings County and other parts of the Province are very fortunate to have such a standing and consistent winner at their disposal and to have such a wonderful horseman as Mr. McClumphaa who has gone to such a heavy expense to have this fine animal imported. It is understood that he is the highest priced stallion ever to be brought to the Province.

The horse which is considered to be the best of his kind and moving gait of any Clydesdale ever brought here is expected to weigh a ton when fully matured.
