## Record Crowd Attend Mt. Carmel Exhibition

The annual Mount Carmel and Mont Carmel Exhibition was held yesterday afternoon with the usual display of fine exhibits and possibly the largest crowd in attendance in the history of the Fair. Although the weather was threatening in the morning the sides cleared about noon and a fine summer day encouraged people to attend from near and far. The usual excellent displays of handicraft and home cooking for which this Fair is noted were as fine this year as ever and thousands of people passed through this building admiring the different articles and many of them were sold before the day was over. Professor W. J. Read of Middleton judged the heavy and said that while there got not so many in former years the quality was good. "In general," he said, "it was one of the best shows in Mount Carmel for years." Mr. Read also commented very favourably on the wonderful display of poultry which he said was mostly contributed by four boys and girls of the district. It was the largest display of poultry in the history of the Fair. Mr. E. C. Wright of the Department of Agriculture, judged the cattle; Mr. Alexander Hamilton of New Perth judged the sheep and swine, and the poultry were judged by F. M. Nash and J. E. Azzano of the Dominion Government Experimental Farm. The weight-pulling contest for draft horses drew large crowds of spectators. Rev. Nazaire Poirier, pastor of Mount Carmel, presided at the opening ceremonies and other speakers were: Hon. W.F.A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture; Hon. Martin Galt; Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault; Dr. J. A. Clark, superintendent of the Experimental Farm; Senator John E. Sinclair; F. M. Nash and J. E. Arsenault.

## Making Progress S'ide Air School To Reduce Activities In Rebuilding St. Paul's Church

Excellent progress is being made on the rebuilding of St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church in Summerside which was destroyed by fire on February 3 of this year. Only the brick walls remained standing after the conflagration which broke out at the first Mass being said on that Sunday morning and just after a complete job of redecoration had been completed. The building is being rebuilt as a parish centre with the ground floor being used for school rooms. The basement will be a recreation floor and on the top floor there will be an auditorium which will be used as a church until such time as a new church can be erected across the street. The structure as being rebuilt will be almost completely of steel, concrete and brick. The steel work is complete and the cement floors have been laid. Shingling of the roof with fire-proof singles has been commenced. An old sanctuary which was not part of the main body of the old church has been extended out and the building now has an over-all length of 108 feet and a width of 46 feet. This change gives the church a more massive appearance. A great deal of work was involved in bricking in the former large windows for cutting in new windows for the three floors. The contract is held by M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. and it is hoped that the building will be ready to occupy by the first of the year. All the equipment and materials are of the very latest type and design and it should be one of the most modern buildings in the province.

## Ranks Split On Question Of Party Support

**TORONTO, Sept. 25.**—Political Association, heralded as the most contentious issue on the agenda, fixed its congress tomorrow at the sixth regular convention of the Canadian Congress of Labor and the 725 delegates.  
At one point in the stormy controversy, C. C. L. vice-president Alex MacAulane of Vancouver told the delegates:  
"There is no compulsion on any party. No compulsion on any member either to join or to abstain from any party."  
At its last convention two years ago, the congress endorsed the C. C. F. as the political arm of labor but its extreme left wing lashed out at the party, vowing to support of the Labor-Progressive Party.  
The debate started when H. A. Chappell of Winnipeg, chairman of the Resolutions Committee, read a resolution the committee had chosen as a substitute for 11 political action resolutions submitted by C. C. L. affiliates. The substitute, which this convention adopted, C. C. L. reaffirms the political action program of the congress and urges that the political action committee undertake to make whatever constructive amendments are necessary to advance this program.  
No decision was reached and the debate was adjourned until tomorrow.

## Is Held On Suspicion

**LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.**—(AP)—What police called a Reno wife-swapping but which one of the principals denied was anything of the kind, entered investigation today at the near wounding of Mrs. Carol Kent and the arrest of Larry O'Neal on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon.

Mrs. Kent, 46, and Robert Kent, 31, whom she married less than a week ago, were enjoying a quiet evening at home when a 38-30 rifle bullet shattered a front window of their home, missing her by inches as he hung up.  
Detective J. N. Arnett quoted her as saying:  
"Larry telephoned me Monday and demanded that I leave Bob if I refused. You'll hear from me again in a different way," he said as he hung up.  
Arnett said Mrs. Kent told him O'Neal had divorced her in Reno last April, to wed Kent's former wife, Edna, 28.  
O'Neal declared, Arnett said:  
"I called Carol just to wish her luck in her marriage. I don't know anything about a shot being fired. But I do know that I never did get a divorce from her."  
The shot, apparently fired from the street, 15 feet below, rang upward through the ceiling and into the apartment, which until a few months ago was occupied by Kent and his wife, Edna. They rented from O'Neal and Carol, who lived on the first floor.

## Transport Minister Speaks In Halifax

**HALIFAX, Sept. 25.**—(Special)—"What we have to find, somehow or other, is some way in which the talents of each of us can be applied best in the many tasks that lie ahead," Hon. Lionel Chever, Minister of Transport, today told a joint luncheon meeting of the Canadian Club and the Halifax Board of Trade. The Minister stated that the many difficulties which lie in the path of Canada's reconstruction program must be met in the same way that the challenge of war was met.  
The Minister took the view that transportation was the important link in expanding world and domestic relations. "We are living in an age of transportation," he said. "Never has movement from place to place been so easy as today; nor have human beings ever shown such a passion for movement. Transportation has brought the world closer together. Through the development of modern science, oceans and continents are no longer barriers that separate us, but links that join us."  
He further said that transportation was, in large part, responsible for Canada's present status and it must now serve to unite Canada as it has never before. "It must make Ontario and Quebec better known and better understood in the Mar-
