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## REVOLT SPREADS IN SPANISH PROVINCES

### Dosco Unable To Meet Contracts As Result Of Strike

Two Chartered Steamers For The St. Lawrence Market Are Released By Company.

GLACE BAY, N. S., Oct. 5.—The Dominion Coal Company is unable to complete its contracts in the St. Lawrence market because of the strikes at No. 2 and No. 1-2 collieries. H. J. Kelley, Vice-President of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, announced tonight. He added that two of the chartered steamships engaged in the St. Lawrence trade had been released.

### Will Construct Own Steel Mine Arches

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 4.—Steel arches for Nova Scotia coal mines, although imported from England, will be manufactured soon in the Sydney steel plant of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation. The necessary machinery is now being installed. Manufacture of the arches will give extra work to local steelworkers and result in replacement of more old rail and props with steel.

### TRURO WOMAN FREED IN DEWEY CASE

Mrs. Mary Fielding Acquitted By Jury of Causing Actual Body Harm to Child.

TRURO, N. S., Oct. 5.—Mrs. Mary Fielding charged with assaulting and causing actual bodily harm to two-year-old Buddy Dewey was acquitted today by a jury of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia.

The young child was boarded with Mrs. Fielding for \$2.50 a week while his mother, Mrs. Minnie Dewey, a factory worker went out daily to her job. Mrs. Dewey reclaimed her son when she heard rumors that he was being maltreated. She found him covered with bruises, she told the court.

"A second charge on which Mrs. Fielding was indicted, that of assaulting the two-year-old on August 19 will be traversed to the next session of the Supreme Court.

Commenting on the strike, Mr. Kelley said, "The Dominion Coal Company, owing to their inability to complete their coal contracts, as a result of the strike at No. 2 colliery, have released two of their time chartered steamers. The Selke, the largest boat in the fleet, and the Gypsum King. This is one of the first unfortunate results of the strike."

### HERO IN COMBAT AGAINST PARALYSIS

FORT ERIE, Ont., Oct. 5.—William Tape, 39, infantile paralysis patient five years ago, was revealed today as the hero in combating an outbreak of the disease in this district. He voluntarily allowed blood from his veins to be used for serum in the treatment of four cases of the disease. The four victims recovered. At the time Tape was afflicted, there was not sufficient serum available to enable him to make a complete recovery but he was sufficiently cured to enable him to work.

### Over Score Killed And Hundreds Wounded In Fierce Street Fighting

Reports Indicate General Strike Has Completely Tied-up Industry In Several Sections Of The Country.

MADRID, Oct. 6.—(Saturday)—A violent revolutionary effort to overthrow the government of Spain seemed to be spreading through the land today as the young republic counted its dead in the fighting so far at between 70 and 75.

Reports of fresh clashes and more dead were being received over crippled lines of communication since the government officials placed the number of dead at 50. It was estimated that 1,500 demonstrators, many of them desperate revolutionists, have been arrested. In Madrid alone 500 have been borne off to police stations. Several hundred were wounded.

It was reported early today that extremists destroyed the northern railway line in Corbertoria to prevent the mobilization of troops.

### NEW RULING FOR EXCHANGE

WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—The council of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today announced an experiment aimed at improving the marketing machinery and regulating opening quotations will be put into effect on the futures market next Tuesday.

### Council of 'Peg Grain Market Announces Experiment.

Under the new regulation passed by the council, the market quotation at the opening for wheat, oats, barley and rye shall be determined by bids to purchase or offers to sell, at a price not exceeding 1 cent a bushel above or below the previous closing price. Also, quotations shall continue at variations not exceeding 1-8 cent per bushel until an actual trade is made.

### No Trace Of Missing Ship Off Labrador Yet Found

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.—Angry northern seas gave up no clue tonight to the fate of the storm-battered freighter Millpool, unreported since her feverish SOS calls flashed across the Atlantic seaboard three days ago.

### Steamer Myrtis A Total Loss

Word has been received here that the steamer Myrtis which some time ago ran aground on the Try-on Shoals during a heavy fog while enroute here from Montreal with a general cargo, and was released from her dangerous position the following day by the Government Tug Lisgar, has now been placed by her owners in the hands of the underwriters.

After discharging her cargo here the Myrtis sailed for Dartmouth, N. S., where she at once was placed on the Marine railway slip there for examination as to the extent of her damage which was found to be so great that the cost for repairs would far exceed the amount of insurance the ship carried. The Myrtis is now in Halifax.

### Decrease In Car Loadings

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.—Car loadings on Canadian railways for the week ended Sept. 29 amounted to 59,547 cars as against 61,610 for the previous week and 51,229 for the corresponding week last year. The index number dropped from 68.54 to 56.72, a new low for the year. These index numbers are adjusted for the seasonal variations of 1924-1933 and for the last four years loadings, particularly grain loadings in the western division, have not shown the seasonal increase of that period at this time of the year and consequently the index number in each year has dropped.

### BIGGEST DAY YET FOR LOAN
