EMPLOYER'S WILL GIVES WORKERS GENEROUS GIFTS

MONTREAL GIRLS RECEIVE HANDSOME DOWRIES FROM THE LATE MR. SIAS.

QUARTER OF MILLION FOR EMPLOYEES. EVEN WIDOWS OF LATE SALESMEN ARE TO BENEFIT IN LOCAL BUSINESS RANCH.

MONTREAL, July 28.—Thirty-five employees—twelve of them young ladies—in the employ of the well known tea and coffee firm of Chase and Sanborn, of St. Helen street, received tidings this morning that they have had left to them sums of money ranging from \$300 to \$2,000.

The gifts are bequeathed to them in the will of Mr. Charles D. Sias, senior member of the firm mentioned, whose death took place suddenly in Boston, on June 28th, and who left a quarter of a million dollars to be distributed among about 250 of the employees in the establishments at Boston, Chicago and Montreal.

Each travelling salesman, 55 in number, receives, according to the length of service, from \$300 to \$2,000. To all other employees, who have been for a continuous period of one year or more in the employ of the firm, in any of its various departments recognized as the office department, shipping department and factory department, \$300 each.

In addition to the above, twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) each is given to the widows of five travelling salesmen. After many private bequests to relatives and friends, there follows a lengthy list of educational and charitable institutions who are generously remembered.
