ed sunk by an explosion. The others were blown away.

The government tonight indicated in a "white paper" that there was not "the slightest prospect of reaching any settlement" with Nazi Germany.

The position was given in a long statement dealing with German concentration camps which presented a collection of affidavits, most of which were from British consular officials in Germany, which the government contended showed Nazi "atrocities" and "the treatment of German Nationals in Germany."

The Ministry of Home Security stated tonight an official inquiry had been made into the sounding of air raid sirens in central London this morning. It appears that at one police barracks a message to turn on the sirens and sirens were sounded accordingly.

Back Yard Shelters  
A new development in air raid precautions was the offering of backyard shelters to the public on an installment purchase plan. The shelters can be bought outright or on a monthly payment plan at costs ranging from \$27 to \$40 depending on the size.

Meanwhile Britain kept close watch on the Russian-Finnish negotiations in the hope of gaining enlightenment on the real intention of the Soviets.

The Government was waiting, informed sources said, for the outcome of these discussions before deciding on the usefulness of further efforts to improve relations between the Allies and Russia as advocated in some political quarters.

A "reasonable conclusion" to the Soviet-Finnish talks for which Viscount Halifax has expressed a hope, would in the opinion of informed observers intensify the political demands here for fresh initiative to improve political and trade relations with Russia.

Soviet pressure on Finland for concessions threatening the country's independence, however, would increase British suspicions of Russian intentions, these observers said, and probably delay further diplomatic moves from here.

The Russian-Finnish negotiations likewise were expected to have an important bearing on the progress of the local Association. 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### Tribute To Late Mr. A. E. McLean



The following tribute to Mr. A. E. MacLean, M.P. is from Mr. Graham Rogers, President of the East Prince Liberal Association:

The passing of Alfred E. MacLean is a distinct loss, not only to his wife and family, but to the entire population of Prince County. Indeed it is a loss to the whole of Prince Edward Island for in a parliamentary sense he was continuing to work for the interests of the whole Island Province that he represented at Ottawa for such a long time. Some of his speeches at Ottawa created Dominion wide attention, notably those on the potato question and the sugar question and also his continued fighting for better conditions in the Province resulting in many improvements being made around our Island shores. In his younger days he was a successful farmer and the interest of the farming community were always close to his heart.

In many respects his career politically has been unique. In that he ran thrice for the Local Legislature and five times for the Dominion Parliament and was defeated only once, in the first provincial election he contested. In the Federal contest his majorities gradually increased (with the exception of one election) right up to the last election when he won over four thousand votes in the long history of Canadian politics there may have been other men who won as many elections but it is doubtful if many can boast of steadily increasing majorities.

A Wonderful Tribute  
Such a record is a wonderful tribute to any man and it proves far beyond any kind words that he was a man among men and that if his cause was just it is his duty to stand for it. He stood and fought for what he thought was the right and yet he treated all men alike—whether friend or foe politically—and if their cause was just it is his duty to stand for it. The American continent was settled because of a dream in men's mind—the dream of liberty. But in many ways we became more enslaved than when our forefathers were in Europe. The sort of community we like to build Mr. Fowler continued, is one where everyone would be able to develop himself and to share in the prosperity which the group can bring. Cooperative associations attack a wasteful system of distribution. They can be built on a basis of justice and equity.

Instantly the superiority of cooperative distribution over individual marketing.
