ACCIDENTAL DEATH.—Mr. Archibald Carver, aged 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Carver, formerly of Summerside and now residing at Rosindale, Mass., met with a tragic death in Boston on March 19. Snapping a wire supporting a smokestack 65 feet high as he was emptying a five ton dumping truck at the Park department greenhouses at Franklin Park, he was crushed to death when the iron stack came tumbling down upon him. Mr. Carver was sitting at the operator's wheel in the enclosed cab when the wire snapped and the stack swayed for a moment in the air. He was pinned in and helpless as the stack tumbled down, first striking the one storey wooden roof of the greenhouse and then crashing right across the cab in which he was confined. Men working excitedly to extricate his body. For a time their efforts to move the heavy stack were in vain but finally they succeeded in loosening the lifeless body. A waiting ambulance rushed the body to the City Hospital, but Carver was pronounced dead upon arrival. Besides his parents two brothers and four sisters, all residing in the United States, are left to mourn. Deceased is the nephew of Mr. Joseph MacDonnell of Bruce McKay & Co., Ltd.

Sporting Comment

The bat, ball, glove and other paraphanelia dear to the heart of the baseball fans have made their appearance, which tells us that the great outdoor pastime is just about to be fostered and boosted by the local sport fraternity. Much talk is evidenced and judging by the early season interest manifested it looks as though baseball in Charlottetown is in a fair way of becoming one of the chief athletic attractions.

This season as in the past a city league will be carried on with the Anchors, Rovers and Stars battling for honors, while an Island League will also be under way, with possibly three or more teams entered. With all indications pointing toward an early start it is hoped that the schedule of games will be lengthened, thereby keeping the players on their toes for the fall.

Mr. Ritchie McCoy, Halifax Wanderers football star is at present in the city and resuming old acquaintances. His many friends will be pleased to learn that he has fully recovered from a painful shoulder injury, sustained in a league game in Halifax last year. Ritchie, although only weighing in the vicinity of 140 pounds, enjoys the distinction of being ranked among the Dominion's greatest footballists.

Each talk and I may say a mild sensation has arisen over the attitude of President John R. McVicar and other A. A. U. of C. officials with regard to recent reinstatement of athletes in the Maritime Provinces. The above officials say what they will and will not do if such and such is not looked after immediately.

Regarding the interest shown the past winter in Maritime hockey circles it proved conclusively that the reinstatement of suspended Maritime athletes is the chief means of bringing the interest in hockey back to pre-war days. No doubt that clubs in the Maritimes are deeply grateful to the M. P. B. Executive for what they have done, therefore it would serve, I think, in the best interests of sport, especially in the Maritimes, if the A. A. U. of C. would be guided by the councils of the M. P. B. Executive instead of forming judgments based on newspaper reports from Maritime seekers for office. So far as the cancelling of cards to those who were fortunate to receive same, it is a safe bet that Doyle will be a party to it. They have done everything possible to further athletic interest and conditions in the Maritimes, and if President McVicar wishes to wage war from a constitutional point of view he had better begin to bolster a case by which he can offer an excuse for some of the actions of the A. A. U. of C. Executive at the annual meeting held in Saint John last December, which were certainly not according to the constitution of the A. A. U. of C. The situation of the A. A. U. of C. is heartily endorsed by the majority of clubs, and as a word of advice it would be well for President McVicar and his staff to lay hands off Maritime matters and attend to far worse cases in Upper Canada and the West.

Compensation For British Subjects (Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Mar. 31.—The British Government announces today that it has signed a convention with Mexico for the adjustment of all claims by British subjects for losses due to revolutionary disturbances, whether by rebels or government troops, between 1910 and 1920. All claims are to be filed by the British government, and will be submitted to a commission consisting of a British member, a Mexican and a neutral.

According to the Halifax Herald and other papers there is popular subscription to a fund for Johnny Miles the young marathoner from Sydney Mines—It is a great thing for Nova Scotia to do, it shows the proper spirit. The amounts gathered in each place are not large, but "every mickle makes a muckle," and he certainly needs the money. The "financial" way of the amateur is hard. The trip to the Boston Marathon on April 19th will cost heavy. Johnny and his father and mother are all working people, and really can't afford the big outlay, but Nova Scotia is true to her champion, and is helping out in a praiseworthy manner. Johnny had saved \$550.00, by his industry and frugality, but it was all gone—all for the love of the sport and the glory of Nova Scotia. He plans to be able to "get the money" after the Olympic Marathon in 1928—but that's a long way off.

It would seem fitting and neighborly that P. E. Island should be "in" on this fund for Miles, we share part of the glory. To the certain degree, and besides those Cape Breton people always have the finest heart for home or abroad. I'll enclose \$2.00 as a starter. I feel that many others in P. E. I. will send subscriptions. You can act as treasurer very conveniently and it will look well to have P. E. Island's contribution come from a sport writer of the foremost papers of the province.

If the subscription is raised, it must be done immediately—the race takes place on April 19th. The money might be sent to "Geo. Ahearn of the Halifax Herald or sent direct to Johnny Miles in Boston. It might be exceedingly welcome just the day before he races.

Germany Getting Ready A New York Exchange says: Determined to take a prominent place in that greatest of all sporting events, the Olympic Games, held every four years, the youth of the German nation is making serious preparations to enter a team that will make a good showing in various events against the other nations in 1928.

Long excluded from international competition of this sort, the Germans are digging deep into their energies to make a come-back and show their worth against all fields. The athletes are in training with zeal that is unusual and sport associations all over the country are spreading sport propaganda.

Germany will probably be represented by 400 competitors chosen from 6,000,000 members of the athletic clubs throughout the nation. 125 of these will compete in the track events, twenty-five in wrestling and weight lifting, sixty in swimming, twenty in lawn tennis, thirty-five in rowing, thirty in boxing, twenty-five in cycling, and the other forty-two in sailing and riding. The chief hopes for victory are centered in hockey, swimming, sprinting, and skiing.

In order to get the most up-to-date and scientific aid, the German athletic coaches are importing foreign coaching talent. Five British rowing coaches, among them the famous Tom Sullivan, are at present developing the nation's crews. Intensive training has been the rule for about a year now and large sums have been contributed to make the venture a success. The Government, it is said, has donated almost \$35,000 while banks, firms, and sports lovers all over Germany are joining in the fund of \$200,000 which Germany expects to spend for Olympic Games purposes.

MONTREAL — This market is unchanged in tone and price and there are fewer offerings of car lots from the west. Storing is becoming quite general. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 32, firsts 30, seconds 27-28.

WINNIPEG — This market is steady with dealers quoting country shippers cages returned, extras 26, firsts 24, seconds 30. Prices to retailers are extras 32, firsts 30, seconds 28.
