## WOMEN HOMEFOLK ON ISLE OF MAN

WINNIPEG, Sept. 2.—It was revealed during a convention of Manxmen—ancient women—here that there is an ancient Manx law which says: "If a Manxman should wrong a Manxmaid, she may choose a sword, a rope or a ring."

And it is said that with but one exception, no Manx maid has ever chosen anything but the ring. The one exception chose a rope, but relented half way through, and had the man cut down before he was dead. Then she demanded a ring, but the man refused. He said he had been punished once and was not going to take a second punishment.

Then again, Manx women were given the vote 30 years ago, and the right to accept civic office. Their men say it is because the women are too busy working. At what? Keeping visitors they call it. boarders to us. There are 50,000 people living on the Isle of Man and they have 500,000 visitors a year. The one woman who accepted civic office only did so because her husband died and she had to take his place.

**Female Mosquito Only Does Biting**  
(By The Canadian Press)  
CHURCHILL, Man., Sept. 3.—H. E. McClure, Chicago, attached to the University of Illinois, where he holds a master's degree in entomology, left this ocean port in Manitoba recently after spending an interesting summer proving the female of the species is more deadly than the male—as far as mosquitoes are concerned.

Tracing the life cycle of the mosquito he found it is only the female that possesses the vampire instinct. The north he reported, gets just one crop of the pests a year. To-day mosquitoes are dying off. The breeding season is over. The eggs are laid and are developing into the larvae or "wigglers" stage.

These "wigglers" will be safely frozen into the solid ice of swamp and muskeg this winter. With spring sunshine flies will emerge from the "wigglers" and the new mosquito crop will be here, out for food—and blood.

The mating season is the summer months. Almost immediately afterwards the male dies. The females live about a month, during which they lay their eggs on stagnant water before the freeze-up and commencement of another life cycle.

Male mosquitoes, McClure said, do not bite and play an incidental part. Ordinarily mosquitoes live on the pollen of flowers and do much pollution before they are given credit for.

## Suggests Plan To End Drought

(Canadian Press)  
VANCOUVER, Aug. 31.—Damming rivers to create a huge artificial reservoir to ensure sufficient moisture for the prairie plains is the solution of Herman Trelle, Canada's former wheat king, for recurring drought in the west.

Writing in the Vancouver Sun, Mr. Trelle observes "the Saskatchewan river, draining the great central plain, carries away to the sea by every trickle and stream and tributary the moisture of the soil."

"I would solve this evaporation problem by stopping up the Saskatchewan so that not a quart of water would get out. I would do this by erecting dams—two main dams with smaller ones on the Assiniboine and Red rivers.

"From Medicine Hat through the great central plain only two dams would be needed. The first would back water up to the foothills of the Rockies. The second would be near Saskatoon.

"Creation of this reservoir would necessitate the flooding of farm lands to a distance of two or three miles on either side of the river along its course of 1,000 miles.

"At that, it seems to me fully effective something of the sort would have to be done on the Mississippi and the Missouri in the United States. . . so it would be a plan successful completion of which would involve co-operation between Canada and the United States.

"Creation of this reservoir would wipe out farms on both sides of the river. I would estimate possibly 3,000 families reside in the suggested reservoir area. Farms of these people would have to be purchased by the government. New locations would have to be found for them.

"It is a scheme which would run into hundreds of millions of dollars. The dams alone, both of them as large as Boulder dam, would involve costs which can be expressed only in astronomical figures.

"But we lose more on three ruined crops today than what the dams would be worth. We lose more year after year as a result of drought than what it would cost to buy up the farms.

"And mark you, if this is not done we must face the dour fact that the great central plain will become a desert."

The dams would also be immense sources of cheap electrical power, he said.

## New Species Fish

(Canadian Press)  
SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 3.—A new species of fish that raid oyster beds and stand on their heads while they eat has been found off the Queensland coast.

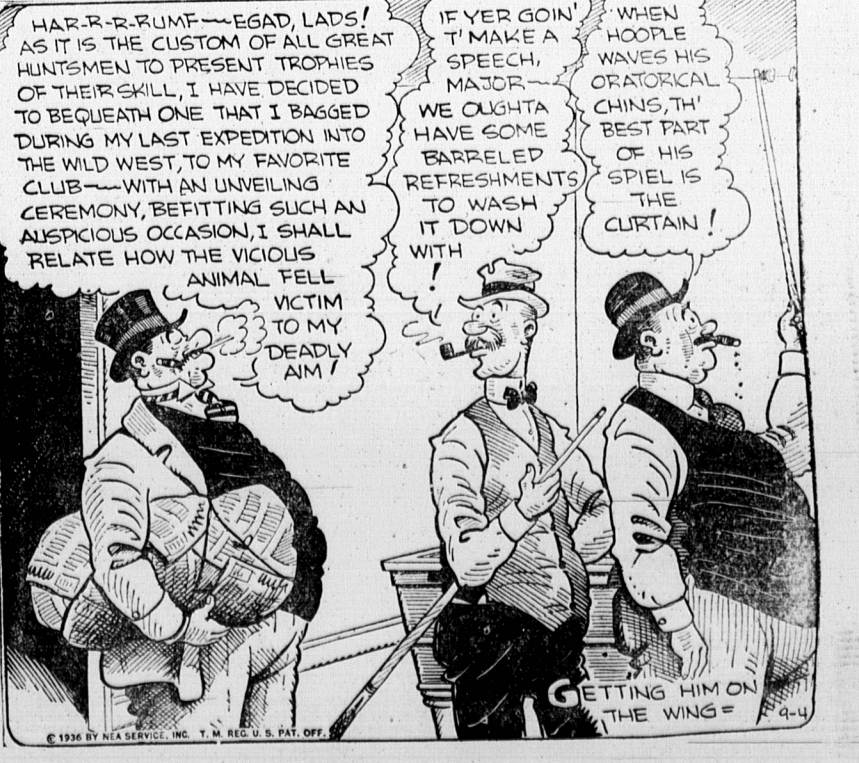
They do not correspond with any other known species, T. Marshall, Queensland Museum ichthyologist, their discoverer, says. He believes they are entirely new to science.

The fish range from 16 to 35 pounds and wrench oysters from supports with their tough lips. When eating they stand on their head with their tail visible above water. The upper body is a metallic green-blue, the lower portion silver and the tail a brilliant yellow.
