They received a big hand from the crowd, with MacLeod finally getting a close judges' decision.

Detroit Manager Assumes Blame For Poor Showing

DETROIT, Oct. 18 (CP)—Manager Jack Adams today assumed responsibility for the disappointing showing of Detroit Red Wings in the first two games of the National Hockey League campaign.

"Our club wasn't ready, and I take the responsibility," said Adams.

The Wings, N. H. L. champions last season, downed Boston Bruins 2-1 in their first game and then lost 5-1 to Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night.

"We didn't work enough and that was my decision," said Adams. "We laid off too soon after playing a long series of exhibition games. I was worried after the opener with Boston when we were tied to win, but against a club that was pretty low. Then came the Toronto game and we were even worse."

To repair the damage, the Detroit boss announced a daily schedule of tough workouts this week—except for tonight when the Wings went to Cleveland for an exhibition game and tomorrow night when they play a scheduled home game against New York Rangers.
