## THE SIEGE OF LADYSMITH.

Is Being Now Renewed With Increased Vigor.

### MORE TROOPSHIPS ARE ARRIVING

Kimberly Suffers But Little—Nothing Known in London or Joubert's Threat—Cables Closed to Foreign Governments—Story of Nicholson's Nek—French Press Bluster—Canadian Indians Volunteer.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(Special).—Nothing is known here of the report that Secretary Reitz has demanded of Gen. White the release of the supposed spy Nathan Marks, threatening to execute six British officers if he is not handed over.

The story is not believed, nevertheless the sensational papers demand if the threat is carried out, that the British retaliate by hanging Kruger and all the members of his Executive Council.

THE SIEGE GROWS HOTTER.

It is now conceded that the siege of Ladysmith is being renewed with increased vigor and the country is watching anxiously for a forward movement for the relief of Gen. White.

TROOP-SHIPS ARRIVING.

The troop-ships Britannic and Caribbrooks Castle have reached Cape Town and the Linsmore Castle and Yorkshire have reached Durban.

The Oriental has left Cape Town for Durban. The government has chartered the S. S. Majestic which is due in New York tomorrow.

KIMBERLEY DOES NOT SUFFER.

The Boer's shells at Kimberly are being fired at long range and do little harm.

WIRES CLOSED TO FOREIGNERS.

The British government has stopped all foreign government despatches either by cable or cypher via the Cape, except those of Portugal to the Governor, of Lorenzo Marques.

FRENCH PRESS IS BITTER.

The French papers are very bitter on the hold-up of the French steamer Cordoba and demand an apology and indemnity.

INDIANS VOLUNTEERING.

BRANTFORD, Ont. Nov. 14.—(Special).—The Six Native Indians have passed a resolution offering three hundred volunteers for the Transvaal war.

NICHOLSON'S NEK DISASTER.

LONDON, November 13.—The Times' Lorenzo Marquis correspondent gives a fuller story of the arrival of Chaplain Mathews and the statements he made. It is the first detailed account of the capture of the two British battalions and the mounted battery at Nicholson's Nek. It says, quoting Father Mathews: "We were sent to occupy the position with the object of preventing the two Boer forces from joining. We started at eight thirty Sunday night and marched ten miles we got to the hill at 1 a. m.

THE FIRST MISHAP

was when the mountain battery stamped and scattered a whole lot of mules. We formed up again and gained the top of the hill. The guns were gone but not all the ammunition. I do not know what stamped the mules, but they knocked me down. It was pitch dark at the time and we had had one hour's sleep. Firing began just after daylight. It was slack for some time, but the Boers crept around and then the firing became furious. Our men made a breastwork of stones. After twelve o'clock there was a general cry of "cease fire" in that direction. Our fellows would not stop firing. Major Adye came up and confirmed the

ORDER TO CEASE FIRING.

Then the bugle sounded "cease fire" There was a rumor in our sangaar that a white flag had been raised by a young officer who thought his batch of ten men were the sole survivors. We were 900 strong having started out with perhaps 1,000. I think that many of the mountain battery men escaped. Our men and officers were furious at surrendering. The Boers did not seem to be in great numbers on the spot, but I heard that the main body galloped off. The men had to

GIVE UP THEIR ARMS.

The officers were sent to commandant Steenekamp. The officers then ordered the men to fall in. The officers were taken away from the men and were sent to Joubert on the same day. The officers went in mule wagons and slept at some store en route. Next day they took a train at Washbank for Pretoria. The officers are very well treated and so I have heard are the men. There has been no unpleasantness at Pretoria. The officers are in the model school and are allowed to walk around as they please inside the grounds. I think the surrender.

A GREAT BLUNDER

and was caused by a misunderstanding. Major Adye was much put out. The white flag was not hoisted by the Irish fusiliers. One or two trifling obscurities in the foregoing do not affect the main fact, which will add to the bitterness of British feeling regarding the disaster. Father Mathews, who is the Roman Catholic chaplain of the Irish fusiliers, is evidently eager that no stigma should rest on his regiment.

## MANILA TIDINGS

Serious Fighting Near San Jacinto.

### AMERICAN LOSS HEAVY

Undertaker Arrested for Selling Bodies—Got \$50 to \$200 Apiece.

MANILA, Nov. 14.—(Special).—The whereabouts of Aguinaldo with his army and cabinet is an enigma, but the Americans hope to corner him by their present rapid movements, and the Filipino people, when they find they are not to be molested, receive them joyously.

BATTLE NEAR SAN JACINTO.

On Nov. 12th, near San Jacinto, 3,300 volunteers charged 1,200 entrenched insurgents.

Major John A. Logan, jr, was killed while leading the charge and 300 Filipinos slain.

The American losses were severe. The insurgents have suffered reverses also in other places.

A GRAVE ROBBER ARRESTED.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 14.—(Special).—The police today arrested Frank Thomson, city undertaker of Memphis, Tennessee, and secured four corpses, being shipped by him to medical institutions.

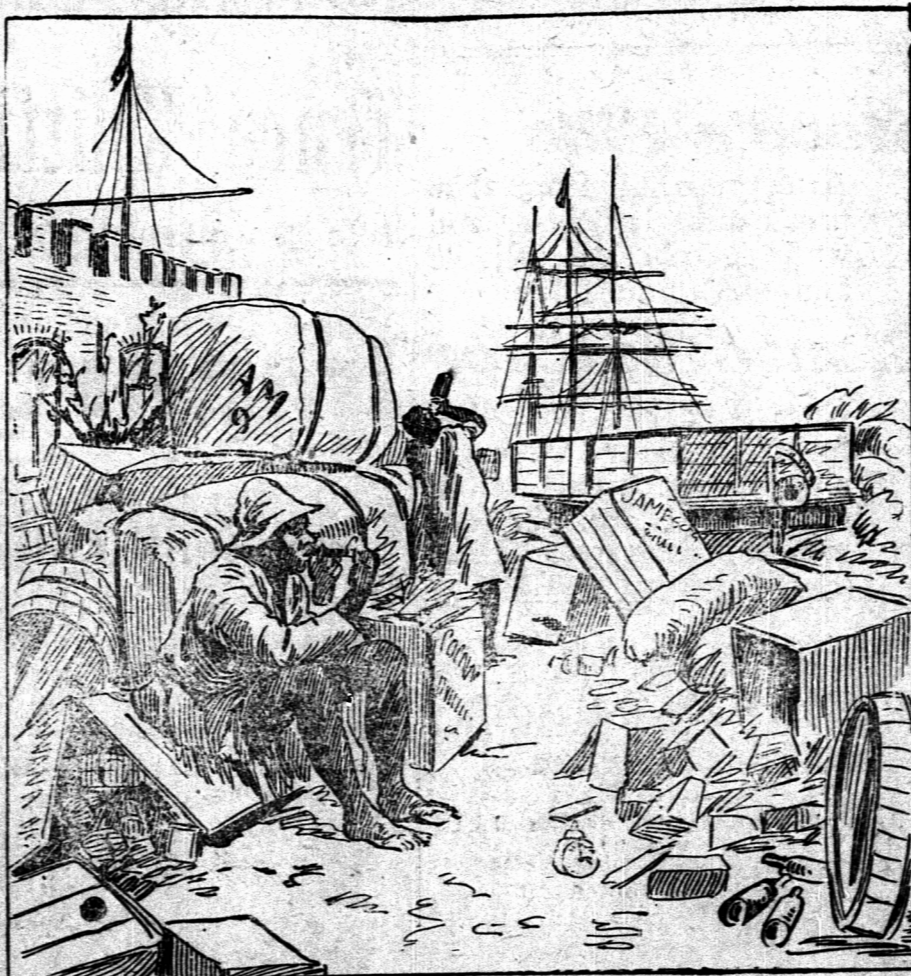
