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**Debate On Wildlife At Tourist Convention**

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 — (CP)—Wildlife, a major tourist attraction but a dwindling Canadian resource, was the subject of a lively controversy today at the fourth Dominion-Provincial tourist conference.

The conference, now in its second day, ran into the topic after Dr. Harrison Lewis, chief of the Wildlife Division of the Federal Resources Department, outlined the situation.

In his review, presented at a conference which has been largely devoted to advertising Canada's natural attractions, the United States Dr. Lewis noted "substantial improvement" in the tone of such advertising during the last two years.

But he urged continued care to exercise restraint in trying to attract tourists by advertising Canada's hunting and fishing possibilities.

This drew from Tom McCall, Ontario Deputy Minister of Travel and Publicity, the statement that the American had been made the "whipping boy" of conservation. Mr. McCall drew strong support from D. Leo Dolan, chief of the Canadian Travel Bureau and chairman of the conference.

Dr. Lewis noted that the increasing population of Canada not only meant more hunters but was driving game into rugged outlying areas where it could thrive no better by comparison than could humans.

Mr. Dolan admitted his bureau had been remiss in one advertising release it had placed in U.S. periodicals, stressing "too poetically" the possibilities of hunting in Canada.

However, waving a copy of "an Ontario paper", he objected strenuously to a quarter-page advertisement sponsored by a group of Canadian sportsmen and aimed to foster the idea that Americans were making wide inroads in Canadian game resources.

H. S. Robinson of the Federal Resources Department said his observation was that more than 90 per cent of Americans obeyed hunting laws and obeyed them well.

Horace Block, director of the New Brunswick Travel Bureau, said sportsmen's stores in his Province told him that American fishermen released practically all the fish they caught, taking only a few on their last day.

"We've found them keen conservationists," he said, "and we want to see all of them we can get."

**No Decision Reached At Hockey Meeting**

A meeting of the City Hockey League, which was held at the Charlottetown Forum last night, was adjourned to a future date when officials, attending the meeting couldn't come to any definite agreement concerning the hockey policy to be carried out in the City this winter.

The meeting, which was presided over by League President, Father George MacDonald of Saint Dunstan's University, and attended by Professor Gordon Bennett, secretary-treasurer and representing Prince of Wales College, W. G. Gillespie and Ed. Garaham of the Charlottetown Victoria A. A. U., Jackie Kane and Art Perry of the Abegweit A. A. U., Norman Macdonald and John MacNeill of Summerside, Walter Lawlor, vice-president of the M. A. H. A. and Mr. Coffin representing the Navy, discussed the pros and cons of the situation widely, but felt that they couldn't come to any conclusive agreement without further consulting their respective organizations.

All pointed out their views concerning City League and intermunicipal hockey competition, but came to no mutual arrangement. The two Summerside representatives stated that there would be no point in coming to any decision on their part, until the Charlottetown officials first decided on a definite policy, and that in the meantime they would take up the discussion at home concerning the possibilities of Summerside having their natural ice rink in operation again this year, which will be a considerable hearing on their future policy for this winter. Mr. Coffin stated that the Navy would not be sponsoring a team in City League competition this year.

**Ramblers' Win Gets Big Hand**

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 8 — (CP)—Congratulatory telegrams streamed into the camp of Amherst Ramblers today. The club won its first game in 14 starts in the Maritime Senior Hockey League last night.

Manager Frank Porter said the team is continuing to gather reinforcements. Although Ramblers had practically exhausted their list of imports, they had the approval of the league and the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association in trying to obtain another defenceman and a couple of forwards.

Approval still has to come from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

**Shotton Reappointed Dodgers' Manager**

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**Good Fight Card Here Last Night; Poulton Wins Split Decision**



Well, Poulton and Lund did it again! The two young local fight promoters came up with another top-notch boxing card at the Whelan Memorial Hall last night before a crowd that literally packed the hall to the rafters, with Poulton himself putting on an excellent exhibition of boxing against middle-weight Pat Davis to earn a close eight-round judges' decision over the tonno-h working, Halifax boxer.

And when we say a close decision, we mean it in the strictest sense of the word, as both boys left little for the judges to choose between them, and both came up with an exceptionally good performance that packed plenty of action and smart boxing with it.

As far as this writer is concerned, Poulton turned in the smartest performance of his career in a local ring, boxing beautifully, with both hands coming into play all the time and executing some class' footwork that had Davis clanking the empty air at times. He flicked out rights and lefts to his opponents head and body that seemed to come from nowhere with lightning rapidity.

But Davis was a stout adversary who took everything and handed it right back again. Although not quite as polished as his opponent, he was more aggressive in the fighting where he scored a lot of telling punches from close in with his more rugged style of fighting and went into some smart bobbing and weaving tactics at times that had Poulton guessing. He fought out of a crouch a good bit of the time, from where he lashed out with some nice straight punches that were finding their mark, and also came up with some vicious hooks and uppercuts that had Poulton in trouble. But amble as a cat, Poulton managed to manoeuvre away from most of them.

Soggy Reid again came through with another gory battle with big Eugene Pendergast of Kensington in a light-heavy semi-final attraction, which although lasted three rounds, was a free clouting affair that saw both boys slug it out toe to toe in a bristling encounter that had the crowd roaring with excitement. Pendergast sent Reid to the canvas in the second round, but Reid got up, and the rugged City scrapper came back strong in the third to batter his opponent ruthlessly to earn a T.K.O. before the round ended.

The other three bouts all came up with smart gallantry, with Bud Lund and Bobby Gallant putting on another hard hitting, fast encounter, with both boys hitting the canvas from some hard punching and two-fisted attacks during their four-rounder, but Lund held the final edge for the decision. Jackie O'Connor, Maritime welterweight titlist, won a decision over Louis Lafferty in another stirring battle, with Garth McGuigan scoring a decision over Young Apps in a bantamweight clash that also provided plenty of action.

He was also the ace south-paw hurler for the N.B.P.E.I. junior baseball champs this season, the Knights of Columbus, and also performed with P.W.C. basketball and rugby squads last season. He was also a member of the P.W.C. Hockey League competition last season.

**Canada Names 61 Entries For Empire Games**

MONTREAL, Nov. 8 — (CP)—Canada's competitive representation for the British Empire Games in New Zealand next February was restored today to practically its originally-planned strength with announcement by general manager Jack Davies that 61 athletes have finally been named.

The announcement followed a meeting of the organizing committee at which George Maccham, president of Canada's B. E. Games Association, said he thought there was enough money in sight to warrant the upward revision.

The original total aimed at was 62. Several weeks ago Davies announced this had been slashed to 30 because of scarcity of funds.

Present making up the full team is 47 men and 14 women, with 18 men and seven women allotted to track and field, compared with the first-planned complement of 19 and seven and the subsequent cut to 16 and six.

Entries in other competitions which had also felt the axe, but with less severity because of lower numerical strength, have similarly been allotted reinstatements.

Returned to the men's track and field squad are George Norman of Toronto, a marathoner, and Don McFarlane of London, Ont., who competes in the 440 and 880-yard runs and the mile relay. He is the brother of Big Bob McFarlane, the quarter-mile specialist, who remains No. 2 on the list.

Gerard Cote, long one of Canada's outstanding marathoners, is still missing as a choice because of his poor showing at the trial last summer, won by Paul Collins of Wolfville, N. S. Cote was placed No. 21 on the recommended track and field list.

The organizing committee filled the vacant vacancy by naming Mel Swartman of Ottawa to look after the boxing squad. Swartman has had 20 years experience in coaching and training boxers and was responsible for the development of several boxers who have competed for Canada at Olympic Games.

**Miners Down Millionaires 3-2**

**Armstrong Warned In Stick-Swinging Incident**

HALIFAX, Nov. 8 — (CP)—Judge J. Elliott Hudson, president of the Maritime Senior Hockey League, said tonight Gord Armstrong of Halifax St. Mary's is being warned about stick-swinging after a scuffle with a fan in a game against Beavers at Saint John Monday night.

During the first period, referee Hugh Gillis tagged Armstrong with a misconduct for swinging his stick at a spectator. Gillis said the fan had held Armstrong's stick during a scuffle with a Saint John player along the boards. The spectator claimed he held the stick to protect himself.

After the game, Gillis reported, a fan who identified himself as John Flewelling came to the referees' dressing room and claimed that Don McLaughlin and Tom Brennan of St. Mary's had struck him with their sticks as the players were leaving the ice.

Gillis and referee Neil Sanford said they did not see any such incident. Judge Hudson commented: "If referee Gillis' report had stated that he had seen the alleged incident which Mr. Flewelling stated had taken place, it would be a very long time before McLaughlin and Brennan would be playing hockey for any club in the M. S. H. L."

The league president added, however, that since the referees had not seen the alleged incident, he had no authority under the hockey rules to suspend any players on the complaint of spectators.

"I am warning all players," he said, "that if they strike any fans before, during or after a game, they hold themselves open to charges of assault being laid against them in the courts and if the charges are proved, being dealt with accordingly."

**North Sydney Player Fined**

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 8 — (CP)—Grant Hall, leftwinger with North Sydney Victorias of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League, today was fined \$10 by league president Dr. Fabian Bates for showing "disrespect to league referees."

The fine was imposed as a result of a misconduct penalty handed Hall in a game with North Sydney last week. Earlier in the season, three players were hit in the pocket-book following a hectic game between Sydney and Glace Bay.
