Huge Throngs Pay Final Tribute To Baseball's King

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP)—New York said a last good-bye to Babe Ruth today with solemn hush and tears.

Police estimated 6,000 persons were in huge St. Patrick's cathedral for the Requiem Mass. Another 75,000 stood in Fifth Avenue and the Rockefeller Centre area surrounding the cathedral in the heart of the city. They were deathly still and many wept.

When the mass ended at noon and the Babe was borne outside in a gentle rain and taken north on the avenue, many thousands of others lined the route.

The cortege went through the Bronx close to Yankee Stadium where Ruth smashed out many a triumphant homer and where 100,000 of his friends and worshippers streamed by his body as it lay in state Tuesday and Wednesday.

Six thousand others made their way to Gates of Heaven cemetery at Mt. Pleasant, N.Y., 30 miles north of the city in the highlands of the Hudson River, for the

A's 10-3 Victory Sends Red Sox Into Third Place Standing

The Philadelphia Athletics downed Boston Red Sox 10-3 Thursday to come to within 2 1/2 games of the American League-leading Cleveland Indians. The Athletics' victory in Boston dropped the Red Sox in third place, 9 1/2 games behind in the pennant race.

The New York Yankees also gained some ground yesterday when they won an 8-1 triumph over the Washington Senators. The Yankees are in fourth place, one game behind the Bostonians.

Other clubs, including the leading Indians, were idle Thursday. Boston used five pitchers in the last three innings in a vain effort to halt the Athletics who drove starter and loser Joe Dobson to cover in a four-run seventh inning before 18,846 fans.

Dobson hasn't won a game since he regained his 13th triumph in Boston July 26, a 3-0 shutout over Cleveland.

Dick Fowler of Toronto, who won his 12th against four defeats, was replaced in the eighth inning at his own request, Fowler placed and was replaced by left hander Lou Brissie after Birdie Tebbets singled.

Brissie fanned the next three batters in succession. The only one of the Sox to get on against him was Ted Williams who was brushed by a pitch in the ninth. Pete Suter hit his fifth homer of the season for the A's for two tallies in the second.

In Washington, righthander Ailie Reynolds of the Yankees posted his 12th American League victory of the season. He also ignited a six-run fourth-inning rally that enabled the Yankees to win the game when he singled with the bases loaded and two out to send home the first two runs of the inning.

Joe Dimaggio started the round with a single.

Dimaggio didn't show up at the park until the top of the third inning. The Yankee clipper flew in from New York where he had been one of the 57 honorary pallbearers at Babe Ruth's funeral.

The Senators scored their lone run in the third on Mark Christman's double and a single by pitcher Early Wynn, who now has lost seven straight games.

RIVERSIDE GOLF CLUB, N. B., Aug. 19—The 56th annual CANADIAN LADIES OPEN GOLF TOURNAMENT will begin tomorrow over the undulating fairways of this Kennebecas River par-70 layout in the first 18 holes of the 36-hole Canadian Ladies Interprovincial Golf Tournament.

Every Province but Alberta will be represented by the Maritimes combining their best in a single entry. The first tee-off is slated for 1 p.m. A.D.T.

Widely scattered showers have been forecast for this region Friday morning with a prediction of a clear afternoon with wet greens. The final round will start Saturday.

Interprovincial play is a curtain-raiser to the six-day medal and match play in the 38th Canadian ladies' open golf championship, beginning Monday. Last year's champion, Miss Grace Lennox, Indian Hill country club, Newington, Conn., will defend her title against a field of more than 95 entries, including 30 of Canada's top low-handicap women golfers.

Quebec last year's winner with 715, has entered another powerful team. Top shots for the French Province are Mrs. T. M. Lockwood, Kaniwaki, a low handicap player, and Mrs. W. H. Smith, Ottawa Riverhead. Rounding out the team are Mrs. J. C. Whitehead, Laval, and Mrs. Graeme Pyke, Whitlock.

A strengthened Maritime team hopes to better its 808 last-place showing at Toronto. Leading the province will be Mrs. Blair Gordon, St. Andrews, N. B., and Montreal's New Brunswick champion, and Mrs. H. P. Connor, Halifax, Maritime champion.

Mrs. Connor topped the Maritimes last year with 189 and she will be joined by another veteran, Mrs. H. S. Gregory, Rothesay, N. B., who had 205 at Toronto. Making her debut with Mrs. Gordon is Mrs. Constance Archibald, Truro, N. S.
