PROHIBITION CASE.—Stipendiary Wright delivered a written judgment at Summerside yesterday, in the case of Prosecutor Phillips against Dr. McBride, Kensington, which case was heard some days ago. 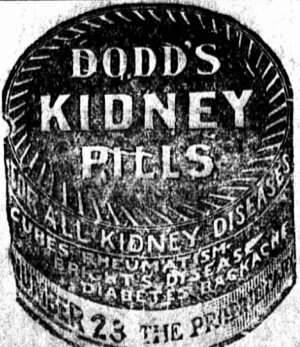
