

THE LEGISLATURE

Simpson professed that he did not quite understand the bill and the discussion had not enlightened him. The Premier suggested that progress be reported as there was other important business pressing. Shortly after 12 o'clock progress was reported. The bill to incorporate the George E. Brown Fur Farming Company was agreed to in committee, Mr. Dobie in the chair. The bill to incorporate the Town of Georgetown was read a third time and passed. The House in committee considered the bill to amend an Act relating to the collecting of taxes and assessments. It was explained by the Premier that it would be more convenient to incorporate the provisions of this bill in another measure to be introduced later. The bill was then in effect withdrawn by a motion that the chairman leave the chair. THE PREMIER moved the House

into committee on the bill to amend the act to impose taxes on companies and brewers. It provides for the payment of taxes for broken periods, or part of a year, in proportion to the tax for each full year, and makes it imperative to pay in advance. It was agreed to without amendment. The PREMIER moved the House into committee on the bill to amend the Act to provide a new jail for Queen's County. He explained the object of the bill is to provide machinery for the issue of debentures, which was not provided in the Act. It was agreed to without amendment. Arbor Day for the rural schools of the Province falls this year, by appointment of the Superintendent of Education, on Friday, May 10th. It is expected that every teacher will prepare a program, make all necessary arrangements for the proper observance of the day, and endeavor to secure the co-operation of trustee and pupils in the work of cleaning and grading the school grounds, planting trees, making flower-beds, laying out school gardens and otherwise in proving and beautifying the school surroundings. In every school something can be done to make the school buildings and grounds more attractive.

The Empress of the P. E. Island Steam Navigation Company, made her first trip from Summerside to P. E. I. on Thursday morning, and returned in the afternoon. She will hereafter make regular daily trips. Capt. Cameron, who is again in command this year, reported that he met very little ice in the straits. Though the spring has been cold and backward, navigation between these ports has opened a week earlier than last year. Considerable quantities of potatoes, it is said, are to be shipped from the Island and those farmers who have a surplus will get a good return, on account of the high prices that prevail in Ontario and the United States.—St. John ex.
