WASHINGTON, Nov. 5—(AP)—The British press service announced tonight that 19 persons, two Canadians and 17 Americans, going to sea in service with the civilian merchant corps there were aboard a ship sunk at sea and were presumed lost.

The press service said it had been requested to make the announcement on behalf of the Royal Air Force and that no further information was available.

It was not announced from what the ship had sailed or when the sinking had occurred.
