Lowering skies in the morning finally culminated in rain, first a drizzle and then a fairly good down pour before the third day's racing was concluded at the Exhibition grounds yesterday. It would have been a banner attendance but for the weather factor and as it was the Grand Stands were comfortably filled.

The four classes were concluded at 5.30, Willard Kelly accounting for the third and last heat in the Three-Year-Old Trot and Pace with Leta Kalmuck. Between the weather, accidents and other happenings, the day did not start off very auspiciously.

In the first heat of the first race the 2.21 mixed-up as Keystone was leading into the home stretch, Quaker Girl struck the bike with her feet. It crashed and driver Conroy was thrown off and dragged. Quaker Girl's driver was also thrown off. Jack Hardy and Jolly-Jet also succumbed in the mix-up.

The heat was won by Foxy Pete with Firelog second, Diamond Mac third, the other horses being placed. It looked very much as though Keystone would have won the heat had he not been interfered with.

The Free-for-all of course attracted the most attention and people were present in large numbers. It was a bit unruly as the start was nearly as exciting as expected, as Toll Gate 2.00 had too much edge for the others. Dermat, who had won in Sydney from Toll Gate, could not get nearer than his silky wheel yesterday.

The first and second heats which were paced in exactly the same time, the only horse who showed a slower than the Provincial record established by Toll Gate last year at Charlottetown. The difference in time is partly accounted for by the slower track.

The 2.21 Trot had five good trotters lined up as starters, but they were a lot of scores and taxes the patience of the starter until finally they got the word with Calumet Bee practically at a stand still.

This race was thought to be between Bonnie Cameron and Alan Harvester, Calumet Bee not being considered because of her poor showing in the 2.18 Trot on Tuesday and whether it was the softer footing or contribution on her part for her former performance, we cannot say, but yesterday when she got squared away she was a real good trotter and took a new win record of 2.11 1/2.

The story of the first heat was given above. In the second heat, after the word Go, Alan Harvester, who had the pole, went right to the front, Mr. Squires second, Calumet Bee third, Bonnie Cameron, who got a bad send off and made a break, fourth. Calumet Bee trotted level and true and gradually closed up on Mr. Squires, passed him, then when the home stretch was reached driver McNeill pulled out from behind Alan Harvester and the two trotters put up a real battle to the wire.

The Three-Year-Old Trot and Pace had a lineup of six youngsters and in the first heat two of them were regrettably distanced, Bud Aubrey 2.28 1/2, who was the winner of the Two-Year-Old Futurity last fall, and the other June Worthy.

Willard Kelly driving his Leta Kalmuck fully won in straight heats, the only horse who showed opposition coming from Holly Britton who was right on Leta's neckle each time.

Clubs Divided Over Night Baseball

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Major League club owners still are sharply divided over night baseball, tried successfully this year by Cincinnati Reds, but latest indications point definitely to its extension in 1936, with the American League following the trail blazed by the National.
Previously confined to the minor leagues and scored for years by the major league magnates, night baseball now is being eagerly discussed and advocated by the owners. Several of them considered the Cincinnati test conclusive and feel that the national sport's appeal, under certain limitations, will mean "financial starvation" for second-division clubs. Others, like Frank J. Navin, President of the Detroit Tigers, are outspoken in their opposition.

Navin recently expressed the opinion night baseball "would be the beginning of the end for the major leagues" but this viewpoint is not generally shared.
Here's the current line-up, based on a poll of club officials by the Associated Press:
Clubs operating or definitely planning night baseball: Cincinnati Reds, Boston Braves and Washington Senators.

Clubs "open-minded" but inclined favorably: St. Louis Cardinals, Chicago Cubs, Philadelphia Phillies, Chicago White Sox, Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Browns.
Clubs definitely opposed: Detroit Tigers, Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox, New York Giants, New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers.

Non-committal: Philadelphia Athletics.
From this it can readily be seen that the balance of power on the subject is held by the clubs adopting an "open mind" attitude. The chances are that most of them will swing to the support of giving the night game a trial when the issue comes before the next annual meetings, in December. By that time they will have the opportunity to digest the results of Cincinnati's experiment.

Bill Terry, Giant pilot, countered by sending Al Smith to the hill and Grim took O'Dea out and called upon English. He smacked a single to bring Demaree in.
Al Hollingworth held the Phillies to three hits, at Philadelphia, two doubles and a triple, as the Reds pounded out a 9-1 victory.

Three home runs carried the visitors to triumph. In the first inning Babe Herman smashed one over the fence with two men on base. In the fourth Kampouris lifted another into the field bleachers with one on and in the fifth Cuyler clouted one into the same spot. St. Louis was rained out at Brooklyn.

RED SOX DEFEAT TIGERS
NEW YORK, August 22.—Boston Red Sox climbed over the League leading Tigers at Detroit today to regain third place in the American League standing with a 10-9 victory. The triumph put the Sox ahead of the beaten White Sox and Cleveland Indians while the Tigers held their seven-game margin over the Yankees.

A six run outburst in the eighth inning gave Boston the game after they had lost an earlier lead. Dibs Williams began it with a home run, and Babe Dahlgren, who had hit for the circuit in the second game, followed with a double. The Sox's 33rd homer of the year in the first, followed with a double. A hit a walk and an error then was followed by three more blows before the side was retired.

The Browns and the Yankees took turns at trying to lose a ball game at St. Louis but the home team finally got the best of a ragged contest 12-9.
